PUTTING LIFE INTO DEAD MONEY.

The recommendations of Postmaster-General Gary in his annual report in favor of postal savings banks fully carry out his repeated promises of lending the influence of his official position to this much-needed and long delayed improvement.

Since no word of protest has been heard against it there is every reason to hope that the proposition will secure suitable legislative enactment. But there is no reason why such enactment should not have been secured long ago. The postal savings bank, which is with us an innovation and an untried experiment, has been for years an assured success in nearly every European country.

There is one class of people to whom the system should especially commend itself. The experience of Europe has shown that the postal savings bank enjoys the confidence of those who mistrust all other depositories, and who without this opportunity would keep their money in hiding. In other words, it would bring into healthful circulation and active use millions that are now hoarded, a sum estimated by the Postmaster-General at \$350,000,000. It has been correctly described as "putting life into dead money," and accordingly presents itself as a remedy for the complaint that there is "not enough money in the country" for the needs of the people.—World.

Damages for Black Listing.

F. R. Ketcham was awarded a verdict of \$21,666.33 by the jury in Judge Clifford's court in Chicago, in his suit against the Northwestern Railroad for \$25,000 damages for black-listing.

During the great strike of the American Railway Union Ketcham was employed as a conductor for the Northwestern Railroad. He joined the strikers, and since the strike Ketcham claims he has been unable to secure steady employment owing to the fact that he was black-listed and other rail road companies refused to employ him on being given his name.
