The Pennsylvania railroad voluntary relief fund has attained mammoth proportions. In 1897 \$631,083.81 were paid out of benefits. In 1898 the number of members was 10,952 and last year it was 43,975. The fund now has in its treasury \$463,379.56.

It was determined by the Westmoreland County Commissioners a few days ago that all aliens employed in the county who send their children to the public schools must hereafter pay a tax. It is claimed there are several thousand aliens in the county who are not now paying school tax. The law passed in 1895 will be strictly enforced.

A novel discovery was made by David Burkhardt, of Belsano, Cambria county, last week. While looking over the Bible Mr. Burkhardt found written on a blank page the will of his wife who died recently. The document is valuable to the husband, as it makes him heir to considerable property.

Uncle Sam is in right shape to go hunting for Spaniards. Over 250,000 men can immediately be armed with rifles from the Springfield armory, if necessary. There are stored in the different arsenals within the armory grounds in that city 102,000 Springfield rifles. These are of the old model, which was discarded for the Krag-Jorgensen rifle, now being manufactured.

The judicial investigation of bribery in the Philadelphia councils conducted by Judges Brey and Gordon, is panning out "pay dirt" of the most loathsome character. Councilmen have testified to offers of from \$5,000 down to \$500 for their votes. In some cases they were accepted and in others rejected. The evidence is direct, and apparently makes out a clear case against the jobbers engaged in getting through an ordinance leasing the city water works to a private corporation at figures so fat as to make nice divvys for some councilmen.

A number of arrests have been made

and Peter E. Smith, a prominent Republican politician who had charge of promoting the job in councils, has been held in \$10,000 bail for trial on a charge of bribery.

The Uneasy Emperors.

With his army engaged in shooting down agrarian rioters in Hungary, with the Bohemian Diet suspended in the hope of averting a revolution, with municipal government in Vienna a victim to the virulence of anti-semitism, one would suppose that the poor old Emperor of Austria would have enough to attend to at home without interfering in American affairs which do not concern him.

And with Russia plumping down 90,000,000 rubles for an extra naval appropriation in view of Eastern complications involving Germany, and with the Socialists in the Reichstag holding a check on the finances of the German Empire, one would suppose that even William the Sudden would refrain from re-echoing any of the Quixotic sentiments of his imperial cousin of Austria on the subject of the danger to Europe from our interference in Cuba.

But since it seems to be impossible to restrain these uneasy monarchs by mere suggestions of common sense. It may be worth while to convey to them the additional suggestion that if they want to make American action more emphatic and aggressive the best way to do it is to intimate that Europe proposes to prevent us.

Thus far we have tried to keep cool in regard to Cuban affairs and have achieved a reasonable success. But if anything could make us hot under the collar and spoil our temper it would be a notification from Europe that we must get permission from Francis Joseph and Kaiser Wilhelm before wiping out the blot on civilization in Cuba.
