The Spaniards are not much on a naval fight, but are amazing on a Sunday bull-fight.

Quay, it seems certain, will have control of the state convention, but may not insist upon having his man Stone nominated for governor, as it might turn out a Delamater swamp.

The general belief is in the direction that our authorities at Washington have dilly-dallied too much in prosecuting the war about Cuban waters, not yet having made an important strike, yet promising something decisive every day.

The Centre Democrat notes that the friends of Wm. C. Heine, Esq., suggest his name as a suitable candidate for Senator. Mr. Heine is an unflinching, working Democrat and has earned the position many times over by valuable service to the party.

Congressman Hicks having written a letter to John Wanamaker denying that he had any interest in the sale of post-offices, Wanamaker replies that it seems Hicks means the \$3000 T-charge fits him and that he is ready to meet Hicks on the charge. What will Hick's do now?

The French authorities have given assurances that the French press criticisms came from an unrepresentative class of radical Parisian newspapers, and in no way represented that cordial sentiment entertained by the French Government and French people toward the United States.

While Gov. Hastings has been busily engaged in getting ready Pennsylvania's quota of troops for the volunteer service the State political machine has been just as busy in the effort to defeat his friends in the election of State delegates from Centre county, where the Governor's home is.

The Democracy of this county will not fail to have a strong ticket in the field since there never was a better, cleaner set of Democrats in the field seeking nominations. With such material we can hope to build up the party again in this county. Poor material and trading Democrats have done much to break down our majorities.

The oleo laws have been decided to be unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court, and thereby reverses the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania which had decided the oleo laws constitutional.

This will greatly mortify our granger friends who were educated up to strong faith in the oleo law and were its main champions. The U. S. court decided the oleo law conflicts with the Interstate Commerce law, which many grangers championed but now upholds oleo.

In this lovely county of Centre Jack Dale held up the Quay end and Wilbur Reeder the Wanamaker end of the Republican party. The Wanamaker end swung highest, the Reporter doing some in the direction of educating the people in the jobbery of Quayism, the Republicans hereabouts freely taking our wholesome advice.

The Navy Department is proud of the record made by the Oregon, from an engineering point of view. The reports to the Department from the ship show that she does not need 5 cents' worth of repairs to her machinery after her 13,000 miles continuous run. The record is said never to have been equalled since the building of the first iron war ship.

We are wrestling with the Philippine problem. Are we to retain the islands, or turn them over to the insurgents, who are also fighting to rid themselves of their Spanish oppressors? Or shall we restore the islands to Spain, or auction them off to the foreign Powers which seem anxious to secure a footing there? These are the questions that have arisen, and they constitute about as interesting a question as our editorial and political statesmen ever grappled with. It is not only a new question, but a very important one.

The Keystone Gazette thinks the Reporter does a wrong to congressman Arnold in its allusions to the sale of post-offices. The Reporter did not say that our member had a hand in this new game of corruption, but what we did say was that Republicans, applicants and non-applicants for post-offices, charged that post-offices were put out for a price in this county by leaders at Bellefonte. Now, since we have it from so high a Republican authority as John Wanamaker that the infamy was practiced in other counties the complaint of Republicans that it was done in Centre county seems to be plausible.

The Republican county convention on Tuesday was a most bitter factional contest between the Wanamaker and Quay people. On the street, previous to the opening of the convention, it was daggers, and after the assembling in the court-house at 12 m., it was a Kilkenny cat-fight, in which the Wanamaker cat got in the biggest scratches.

The Wanamaker people had a working majority, and easily elected their delegates to the state convention, and carried instructions for Wanamaker for Governor. Elsewhere we give the proceedings.

The Republican post-masters in this county occupy a laughable position. When things ran in the Hastings-Wanamaker channel, all were loud for Hastings but when Quay's say fixed the post-office appointments then Peter-like they slunk away from their Dan and Quay became their beau ideal. Now since it may happen that the Hastings-Wanamaker element may break the foul Quay machine, then each one of these post-masters will climb on the top rail of the fence and swear he was and is an original Hastings man and thinks a heap of Wanamaker. Of course, they are men of pure motives.

We are doing one thing now, (last week), in isolating Cuba by cutting all foreign connecting cables, that should have been put under way the day war was declared. The same as to the bombardment of the Cuban towns and destroying their batteries. We have been waging a kidglove war in some respects, and it is full time to end it and take up serious work. Our authorities are more intent in finding out where the Spanish fleet is or is not than in dealing out hard knocks to the Spaniards in Cuba. General Lee told the Senate committee he would undertake to march through Cuba with ten thousand men, but he has never been given the opportunity, because all efforts were devoted to locating the Spanish fleet and none to relieving the Cubans. The truth is that but for Dewey's brilliant achievement, outside of telegraphic orders from the strategy board, the account current of military and naval achievement would not be particularly brilliant.

TWO DISBARMENTS.

The disbarment of two Philadelphia attorneys within a week for unprofessional conduct indicates the purpose of the censors of the Law Association and of the Courts to purge the list of attorneys of this jurisdiction of the names of those who are betraying their trusts and disgracing an honored calling. Judge Arnold in disposing of the Maires case expresses the hope that if there are any more lawyers in the city guilty of "common barratry" they may be brought to book and expelled from the profession. The Board of Censors of the Law Association will doubtless follow remorselessly any clues to similar practices which they may discover, so that "lawyers," to use Judge Arnold's language, "who make it a business to hunt up litigation and take cases upon speculation, with the usual resulting quarrels with their clients, based upon a dishonest and unfair division of the money received," may be prevented from long-erplying their perfidious trade by disbarment.—Ledger.

By a lawyer being guilty of "barratry" is meant, "the practice of exciting and encouraging to lawsuits or quarrels" or having some one to do it.

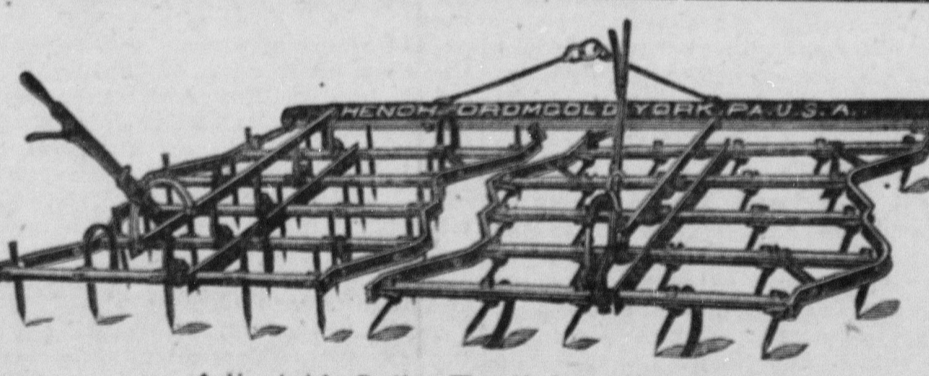

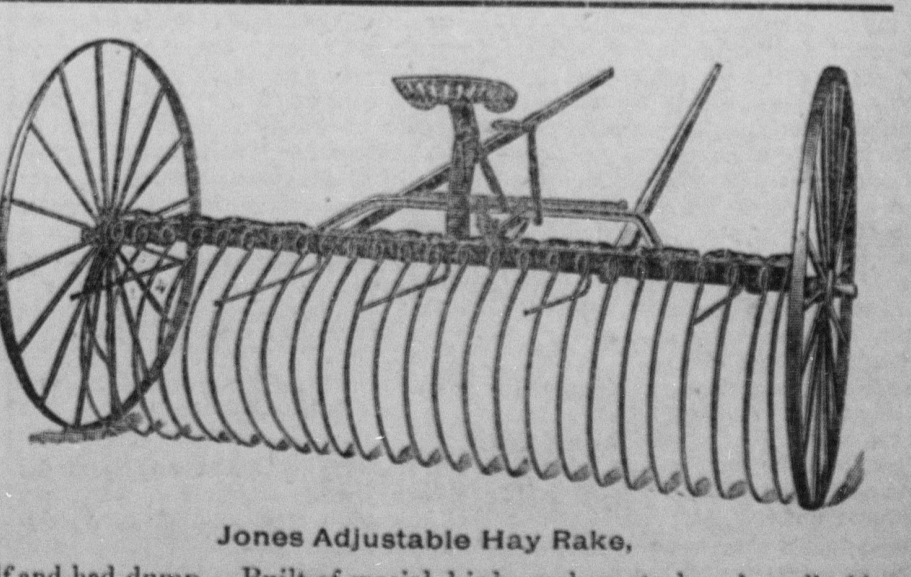
