OLD GLORY OVER SANTIAGO.

SPANIARDS ŞURRENDER EASTERN CUBA.

Spain Evacuates the City on Sunday Morn-Ing .- American Troops Now Occupy the Chy.

Old Glory is now floating over the fortifications of Santiago. At 9:00 o'clock Sunday morning the Spanish troops, under command of General Toral, left their trenches and marched into the American lines, where, one by one, the regiments laid down their arms. At the same time the Spanish flag was hauled down and the Stars and Stripes hoisted in its place, The work of loading the Spanish prisoners on transports, preparatory to sending them back to Spain, will be commenced as soon as ships are provided.

The authorities at Washington have been urged to use haste in this matter. STAMPS TO BE USED.

What the War Revenue Act will Require Payment of an Internal Revenue Tax Upon

The new war revenue act became effective July 1st, and stamps will be required to be affixed to bank checks, telegrams, leases, mortgages, etc., as follows:

Bonds, debentures and stock certifi. cates, 5 cent stamp.

Bank checks, drafts or certificates of deposit, 2-cent stamp.

Promissory notes or United States money orders under \$100, 2-cent stamp. Each additional \$100.2-cent stamp. Telegrams, 1-cent stamp.

Life insurance policies, exclusive of those issued by fraternal organizations,

8-cent stamp. Insurance policies, marine, inland, fire, casuality, fidelity and guarantee, of I per cent. on each dollar.

Leases, one year, 25-cent stamp; over one year and not more than three, 50cent stamp; over three years, \$1 stamp. Mortgages, 25-cent stamp.

Passage ticket , United States to foreign ports, under \$30, \$1 stamp; be-

Power of attorney or proxy for voting at election of officers of incorporated companies or associations, barring
