New Postal Cards.

The postoffice department is soon to issue a new set of postal cards, slightly smaller than those now in use. There are to be three styles of cards in the new issue. The ordinary single card, for both domestic and international use, is to be 3½ by 5½ inches. There are to be smaller cards for domestic use only, to be 2 16-16 by 4 15-16 inches, and a double return card, for both domestic and international use, which is to be 51 by 61 inches. The smaller card is an entirely new size; the ordinary single card is to be one-fourth of an inch narrower than the corresponding card now in use, and the double reply card is also reduced a quarter of an inch in width.




