Spain was swept by a hurricane on 19, by which six lives were lost and 85 houses demolished.

Judge Ermentrout, of Reading, a few days ago ordered the indictment of both branches of Reading City Councils for misdemeanor in office for their failure to repair certain streets reported to the Court.

Only think of it, taxpayers, the expenditures of the state administration are now more than double what they were under Pattison. Reason: The money is stolen by the machine.

The Republican platform endorses the administration of state affairs, and that means if Daly and Townsend are elected to the legislature they will vote for mileage, junketing and all other steals of the Quay machine.

On the basis of the average receipts from beer stamps in 1897, the war tax on beer is adding about four millions and a quarter to the monthly receipts of the Treasury—more than \$50,000,000 a year.

Since Jan. 1 we have exported \$7,660,874 of gold. During the same time we have imported \$77,283,122. That is to say, our net import of gold has been \$69,622,248.

The Republica, a Filipina paper, asserts that an attempt was made to poison Aguinaldo on Friday night. A steward, it is alleged, saw a Spanish prisoner who had been allowed his freedom make a movement which appeared like tampering with a bowl of soup intended for Aguinaldo.

The independent Republicans, or rather anti-Quay element of the Republican party in the State, are uniting right along with the Democrats on legislature, Senate and Governor, the fact having dawned upon them that to vote for Dr. Swallow would be only side-tracking the influence which might be voting direct for George A. Jenks destroy this "one man power" and give back to the people the power which belongs to them.

ONE thing Congress should do at its next session is to repeal the unjust and antiquated law providing for the payment of prize money to the navy. A memorial presented to the President on Thursday by a committee representing a conference recently in session at Saratoga called for such action by Congress.

A SERIOUS CHARGE. Mr. Sowden, in a speech, a few days ago, made the following serious charge against Wm. A. Stone, Quay's candidate for Governor:

I assert here and now that Colonel William A. Stone charged the State a fee of \$10,000 for an unsuccessful attempt to collect \$3,000. I challenge a contradiction. Mr. Stone's only reply to this charge is that the money was there and that he might as well have taken it. Is that honest? Is such a man fit to be your governor? We have

a candidate who will not steal. Do you want an honest man as your executive? Are you interested enough in your own affairs to exert your manhood? These are questions the voters must answer for themselves in this campaign."

Admiral Dewey thinks the situation in the Philippines critical and has asked for an additional cruiser and a battleship. Aguinaldo boasts of his strength and may cause trouble.

The battleships likely to be sent to Dewey are the Oregon, Iowa and Texas, to join the Manila fleet.

The California Powder Company and the Dupont Powder Company, each has a contract to furnish the government with half a million pounds of smokeless powder, at 80 cents per lb.

Four persons were killed by a train plunging through a bridge in Texas.

There was a disgraceful tumult in Spain's senate, the other day, arising from disputes about the war. Count d'Almenas declares Weyler, Blanco and Cervera should be disgraced.

Jack Dale, the county leader of the Quay forces, was down to see Quay at Atlantic City, and informed the boss of his winning fight for the machine. Jack is glad and Quay is pleased.

It is expected that Admiral Sampson, who, as fleet commander, shares in the prizes of all vessels captured by his ships, will receive about \$25,000.

The nomination of Wm. C. Heinle for senator, is well received all around. His election is a certainty and he deserves the honor. He came up from the common walks and has always been identified with that which was for the good of the masses.

At a fire in Jerome, Arizona, it is feared fifteen lives were lost.

From all over the state comes news of Jenks' growing strength and the alarm felt over it among the Quayites. Mr. Jenks is now opening his campaign of addressing the people of the state which will add thousands of Republican votes to his column.

William Stanley, of Seattle, had good luck; he brought \$160,000 from the Klondike.

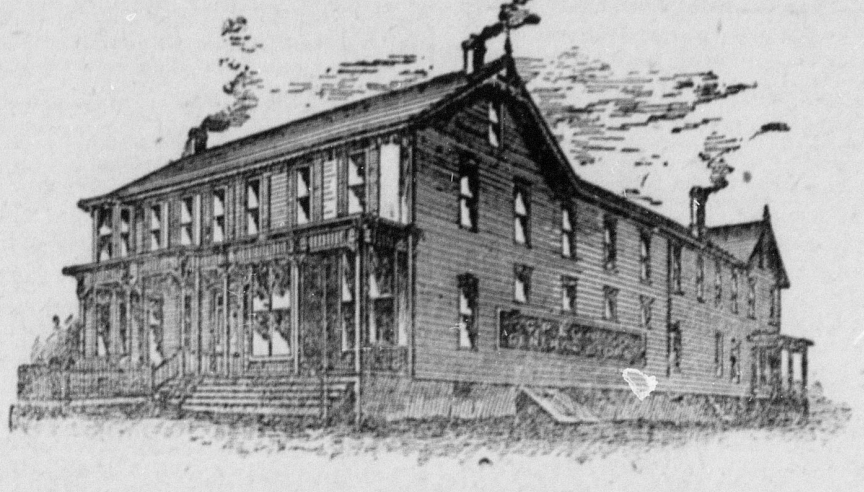
