# DR. TALMAGE'S SERMON.

THE EMINENT DIVINE'S SUNDAY DISCOURSE.

Subject: "The Art of Friendship"-Get Your Heart Right With God and Man and This Grace Will Become Easy-Be an Ezekiel, Not a Jeremiah,

TEXT: "A man that hath friends must how himself friendly."-Proverbs xviii., 24. About the sacred and divine art of making Is America's Greatest Medicine. \$1; six for \$5 and keeping friends I speak—a subject on Prepared only by C.I. Hood& Co., Lowell, Mass. which I never heard of anyone preaching and yet God thought it of enough impor-tance to put it in the middle of the Bible, these writings of Solomon, bounded on one side by the popular Psaims of David, and on the other by the writings of Isaiah, the greatest of the prophets. It seems all a matter of haphazard how many friends we have, or whether we have any friends at all, but there is nothing accidental about it. There is a law which covers the accretion and dispersion of friendships. They did not "just happen so" any more than the tides just happen to rise or fall, or the sun just happens to rise or set. It is a science, an art, a God-given regulation.

Tell me how friendly you are to others, and I will tell you how friendly others are to you. I do not say you will not have enemies; indeed, the best way to get ardent friends is to have ardent enemies, if you get their ermity in doing the right thing. Good men and women will always have enemies, because their goodness is a perpetual rebuke to evil; but this antagonism of foes will make more intense the love of your adherents. Your friends will gather closer around you because of the attacks of your assailants. The more your enemies ase you the better your coadjutors will

think of you.

The best friends we have ever had appeared at some juncture when we were especially bombarded. There have been times in my life when unjust assault multilied my friends as near as I could calculate, about fifty a minute. You are bound to some people by many cords that neither time nor eternity can break, and I will warrant that many of those cords were twisted by hands malevolent. Human nature was shipwrecked about fifty-nine centuries ago. the captain of that craft, one Adam, and his first mate running the famous cargo around on a snag in the river Hiddekel; but there was at least one good trait of human nature that waded safely ashore from that shipwreck, and that is the disposition to take the part of those unfairly dealt with. When it is thoroughly demonstrated that some one is being persecuted, although at the start slanderous tongues were busy enough, defenders finally gather around as thick as honey bees on a trellis

Before you begin to show yourself friendly you must be friendly. Get your heart right with God and man, and this grace will become easy. You may by your own resolution get your nature into a semblance of this virtue, but the grace of God can sublimely lift you into it. Sailing on the River Thames two vessels ran aground. The owners of one got one hunaground. The owners of one got one nun-dred horses, and pulled on the grounded ship, and pulled it to pieces. The owners of the other grounded vessel waited till the tides came in, and easily floated the ship out of all trouble. So we may pull and baul at our grounded human nature, and try to get it into better condi-tion; but there is nothing like the oceanic tides of God's uplifting grace. If, when under the flash of the Holy Ghost, we see our own folbles and defects and depravi-ties, we will be very lenient, and very easy with others. We will look into their characters for things commendatory, and not damnatory. If you would rub your own eye a little more vigorously you would find a mote in it, the extraction of which would keep you so busy you would not have much time to shoulder your broad-axe and go forth to spit up the beam in your neighbor's eye. In a Christian spirit keep on exploring the characters of those you meet, and I am sure you will find something in them fit for a foundation of

Oh, my friends, better sover up the faults and extol the virtues; and this habit once established of universal friendliness once established of universal friendliness will become as easy as it is for a syringa to flood the air with sweetness, as easy as it will be further on in the season for a qualito whistle up from the grass. When we hear something bad about somebody whom we always supposed to be good, take out your lead pencil, and say: "Let me seel Before I accept that baleful story against that man's character, I will take off from it twenty five per cent. for the

nabit of exaggeration which belongs to the man who first told the story; then I will take off twenty-five per cent. for the addi-tions which the spirit of gossip in every mmunity has put upon the original story; then I will take off twenty-five per cent. from the fact that the man may have been put into circumstances of overpowering temptation. So I have taken off seventy-five per cent. But I have not heard his side of the story all, and for that reason I take off the remaining twenty-five per cent. Excuse me, sir, I don't believe a word of it."

Do not prophesy misfortune. If you must be a prophet at all, be an Ezekiel, and not a Jeremiah. In ancient times prophets who foretold evil were doing right, for they were divinely directed; but the prophets of evil in our time are generally false prophets. Real troubles have no heralds running ahead of their sombre chariots, and no one has any authority in our time to announce their coming. Load yourself up with hopeful words and deeds. The hymn once sung in our churches is unfit to be sung, for it

says: We should suspect some danger near, Where we possess delight.

In other words, manage to keep miserable all the time. The old song sung at the pianos a quarter of a century ago was right: "Kind words can never die." Such kind words have their nests in kind hearts, and when they are hatched out and take wing, they circle round in flights that never cease, and sportsman's gun cannot shoot them, and storms cannot ruffle their wings, and when they cease flight in these lower skies of earth, they sweep around amid the higher altitudes of Heaven. DENMARK'S THEATER JUBILEE. The Interesting Exhibit That Is to Be Made in Copenhagen.

One of the principal incidents of the jubilee in Copenhagen this year will be the exhibition devoted to the history of the National theater there, an institution that has played a notable part in the literary history of Denmark. On Dec. 18, next, its 150th birthday will be celebrated, and the exhibition will present souvenirs of every stage of its history, as well as of the most popular actors who have been associated with it in times past. No other feature of the celebration has been attended to with greater care or sympathy than the preparations for the honor to be paid to this theater, of which the country is so proud. The methods and progress of the theater in Denmark from the time that Holberg founded a national theater there about 200 years ago will be depicted in this exhibition. The first theater that he established will be shown, and 12 smaller theaters that succeeded his will be seen, with the improvements in every one. The last example will be a model of the present National theater, showing the complete electric equipment and the final technical completeness of the institution as it was used in a recent spectacle presented there. Some of the more personal reminiscences of the theater are found in the pictures and belongings of the famous artists associated with it, such as Dupui, the French actor, conductor and composer, on whose account the Crown Princess Charlotte was divorced, and a man described at the time as "the darling of women and the ideal of men." The jewels and other objects presented to Johanna Helberg, at one time the greatest of Danish actresses, are also to be exhibited, along with a complete reproduction of the study of Adam Oehlenschlaeger, just as it was when he wrote the works with which his fame is chiefly associated.
