> Those Fire Department Supplies. Several weeks ago there arrived at this station consigned to the boro council over seven hundred feet of hose, two hose carts, nozzles, and apparatus necessary for giving the town the promised fire protection. The goods are now lying in the depot, stowed away in a corner, and we understand the council has refused to lift them. Some members of the body claim to know nothing of any such order from the manufacturers, and wanted to know of other members by whose authority the order was placed, also where the money was to come from to pay for the same. From the latter remark the condition of the boro finances may be judged. The supplies cost about \$300, and if not already taken off the manufacturer's hands a suit in court may follow. The fire supplies may be of great service to the town with the present \$9,000 water plant. Should a fire break out, a couple sections of hose could be attached to the double fire hydrants and the fire blown out. There is always plenty of wind in the mains if there is no water.

The promised "dollar water" was one of the many myths used to obtain voices; now there are higher water taxes paid than before with a shortage of water, with many to make sure of having plenty of water all the time from the old plant, having two taxes to pay! Besides this the boro is in debt over \$9000 dollars! Surely the party with two or three tools that is responsible for this gloomy outlook, must have taken lessons from Quay.

Previous to this there was a comparalively moderate water tax without an oppressive debt upon the boro.
