WANT TO REACH THE TOWN.

The Commercial Telephone Co. Trying to Give Centre Hall Service.

The new Central Commercial Telephone Co., a corporation formed to enter the territory of the Bell Company, in the central part of the state, is pushing ahead with its lines, and is now erecting poles, between Lock Haven and Jersey Shore.

The charter of the Company includes Clinton, Centre, Lycoming, Clearfield, Huntingdon and Montour counties. The main office of the company is in Bellefonte.

The line has been extended to Linden Hall, and a few days ago a canvas was made of the town endeavoring to sell sufficient stock of the company to extend the lines to Centre Hall.

Several subscriptions were taken for stock in the town, but whether sufficient to justify the extension of the line has not been learned.
