The enraged bees stung the men in the hands and legs, and the swelling which resulted prevented them from moving. In the end the Danes and Norwegians retired, and left the Saxons in peace.

Probably the largest grove of Japanese chestnuts in America is situated near Cleminton, N. J. Here a tract of land 500 acres in area is given over to the culture of these trees. The tract was originally a forest of native American chestnut trees. They were all cut down, and after the shoots had grown two years they were grafted with the Japanese chestnut. In from two to three years the grafted trees began to bear, and at the end of ten years they were yielding a bushel of chestnuts to a tree. The orchard, if such it may be called, is crudely cultivated with a rough harrow, and the fallen leaves are permitted to rot and enrich the ground.

The European and the Japanese chestnuts are larger than the American, but by no means so sweet in the raw state. When cooked, however, they are palatable. They are used not only for the enlivenment of Hallowe'en parties, but also for the Thanksgiving turkey, and boiled as an ordinary vegetable. The Italians in this country convert them into meal, from which they make a rich and nourishing cake. The Japanes: chestnuts ripen about the middle of September; the European chestnuts two or three weeks later.

In view of the new interest in the chestnut as an article of food, and, therefore, of industrial importance, scientific agriculturists are making a careful study of the tree and its fruit. The great enemy of the nut is the unpleasantly familiar worm known as the chestnut weevil. It, to, is under scientific investigation, and the best method of destroying it is being made a subject of special study. A blight that is destroying the chestnut leaves is also attracting the attention of scientific agriculturists. In the course of these investigations American men of science have been in correspondence with botanists not only in England, Spain and Italy, but even in Japan.

Machine for Harvesting Grain. On a large wheat farm in California the grain is cut from the stalks, the chaff thrashed out, and the kernels placed in sacks, which are sewed and piled ready for the mill-all by one huge machine, which is drawn by and gets its motive power from a team of thirty-eight mules.
