To Pension Teachers.

A very commendable movement is on foot to pension school teachers after a certain term of service, and a good long term it is, too. The Minnesota legislature is struggling with a bill providing for a teachers' retirement fund which makes it obligatory on the teachers of that state to pay 1 per cent.

May Reduce it to 5 Per Cent.

In view of the plethora of money, it is anticipated in some circles that a measure will be brought before the present session of the legislature to reduce the legal rate of interest in Pennsylvania to five per cent. A similar bill is to be introduced in New York and New Jersey. The legal rate of interest in Pennsylvania on money was 8 per cent. prior to 1823, when it was reduced to 6 per cent., by an act which permitted bargains to be made for a lower rate.

LOILO TAKEN BY THE AMERICANS.

Our forces under General Miller captured Loloilo, capital of the island of Panaya, on Saturday last after bombardment. The rebels set the town on fire before evacuating it, but the American troops extinguished the flames. It is believed that the enemy's loss was heavy, but no casualties are reported on our side.
