KILLED BY HIS PISTOL:

ergeant of the Ninth Immunes Accidentally Shot at Harrisburg-Organs in a Railroad Wreck-Sending Bicycles to Europe-Series of Tragic Events in a Family Near Pittsburg.

Charles Johnson, who was second sergeant of Company M. Ninth Immunes, was accidentally shot at the Pennsylvania Railroad Union Station, Harrisburg. He died a few minutes later. Sergeant Johnson was on his way home to New Iberia, La., having been mustered out, and was waiting for the train going east. He with a number of companions had been engaged in a conver-sation in the waiting room and Charles Wilson, of Neron, Texas, started an argument regarding the value of their revolvers. Wilson liked the one Johnson had and a trade was agreed upon. Just before a settlement was reached in the bargain some one told Johnson that his train was moving. The latter made haste to grab his packages and bundles, and in doing so knocked the revolver to the floor. The hammer struck the flooring and the revolver was exploded, the ball entering Johnson's body below the heart. He fell to the floor with a groan and when picked up was dead. It was at first thought that Johnson had been murdered by Wilson and the latter was arrested, but an investigation showed that it was purely accidental. Wilson took his dead comrade's remains to Louisians.

Tragedy Near Allentown. James Howard, of Scranton, employed on the masoury work on the new addition to the Lawrence Cement Mill, above Siegfrieds, was shot and killed on the bridge which crosses the Lebigh R ver from Siegfrieds to Cementon, Preston Everett is in jail charged with having caused Howard's death. The story of the crime is as follows: Saturday afternoon a party of employees in the cement mill were having a picn'e in the grove south of the White Hall bridge. Between 11 and 12 o'clock rain began to fail and the men went on the bridge, which is one of the oldtime covered structures. In the party were James and Edward Howard, brothers, and about half a doz-n others. Within the past few days there has been a number of holdfrieds side, when the shot was fired. For some time it was not known whether one of the picnicers had fired the shot or whether it had come from the carriage. Howard fell to the ground, and exclaimed, "I am shot!" Six minutes later he was dead.

Railroad occurred in the yards at Fourteenth street, Altoons. Nobody was injured, but several cars loaded with organs, consigned to a firm in Liverpool, England, and three cars of general produce were destroyed, involving about \$50,000 loss.

Sending Bicycles to Europe. The Keystone Bicycle Company, of Lebanon, will send 150 bicycles to a firm in Liverpool, England. The company has just finished 225 wheels to be shipped to Germany and is turning out about 500 wheels a week. They employ seventy-five men and are running full time.

Planing Mill Burned at Milford. Fire, supposed to be due to a lighted cig-arette thrown into a pile of shavinge, destroyed the excelsior factory and planing mill of H. G. Wells, at Milford. Several dwelling houses caught fire, but were saved.

Syndicate Secures Zinc Plant. The plant of the Friedensville Zinc Company, at Friedensville, in the lower end of the county, has been sold to a syndicate headed by John S. Atkins, of New York. The plant comprises twenty-four tracts.
