



Foster's Weather Forecast.

My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm wave to cross the continent from 19 to 23, and the next will reach the Pacific coast about 24, cross the west of Rockies country by close of 25, great central valleys 26 to 28, eastern states 29.

Warm wave will cross the west of Rockies country about 24, great central valleys 26, eastern states 28. Cool

Temperature and rainfall of the week ending 8 a. m. July 3 will average about normal.

The long hot wave predicted in these bulletins will end not far from June 20 with extensive rains and a great fall in temperature, after which the weather will be more agreeable till we reach the heated term of July, complete forecasts of which will be given in bulletin of July 1.

The long-ago forecasts that this would be a year of unusual, extreme and remarkable weather events is being verified by the actual weather of each succeeding week. These extremes will be continued into the fall and winter months with still greater force, and before we get through with these great magnetic disturbances it will have been demonstrated that planetary influences can produce uncomfortable environments for man and beast.



Will be Held at Gettysburg.


