MICHIGAN'S THRUST AT TRUSTS.

One of the severest doses of legislation the trusts have had this year came from the Michigan Legislature before it adjourned the other day. The law is more sweeping than that of Texas. It forfeits the charters of all corporations of the State that join together to create restrictions in trade, or to limit or reduce the production of any article of merchandise, or to control the market price of the same, or to prevent competition. It prohibits the corporations of other States which come within these categories from doing business in the State. It subjects to fine or imprisonment, or both, any person who aids or abets the combinations probabited by the act, and declares void all contracts in violation of the act, and gives to any person injured in a right of action against the offender for double the amount of damages sustained.
