Ten plagues made Pharaoh consent to the departure of God's people, but tell me what Pharaoh of evil habit ever cheerfully con-sented to let any of its victims go. Men talk of evil habits as though they were light and trivial, but they are scorpion whips that tear the flesh; they are spikes more bloody than the path of a Brahman; they are the sepulchers in which millions are burned alive. The young are in more peril because they are unsuspecting. The lions are asleep in their soul, and their power is not suspected. The time when a ship's company makes mutiny is when the watchman is off his guard. When a spider meets a fly, it does not say, "Go down with me to the place where I murder down with me to the place where I murder insects." No; it says, "Come and take a bright morning walk with me on this suspension bridge of glittering gessamer." Oh, there is a difference between the sparkle of a serpent's eye and the crush of its slimy folds! GAME LAW VERY RIGID.

New Statute Forbids the Sale of Deer and Phessant in this State-No More Quail on Toast .- Love Affair Leads Young to Shoot Herself in the Street-Train Hurled Over Embankment.

The State Game Commission met at Harrisburg, President Kennedy, of Pittsburg; Charles B. Penrose, of Philadelphia; E. B. Westfall, of Williams-port; C. K. Soher, of Lewisburg, and James H. Worden, of Harrisburg, being present. The object of the meeting was the discussion of the Lacey game law passed by Congress last Spring.

This law forbids the importation of certain game from one State to another, and it has been decided by the courts that game chipping from one State to another is amenable to the game laws of the latter State. In Pennsylvania the law has been that deer, quail, wild turkey, woodcock and pheasant killed in this State cannot be sold under any conditions.

The Lacey law, however, puts imported game under the ban as well which will prevent the selling of the game mentioned in any part of the State, or the serving of it at hotels and restaurants, since any such sale of game, cooked or otherwise, will subject the seller to a fine of \$25 for every bird, or \$100 for every deer. The commission will prosecute in the United States courts.

Already a hotel keeper in Harrisburg has been arrested for buying a deer last Fall and State Game Warden Kalbfus has secured evidence to show that the deer was run down by dogs, was killed on Sunday and sold, making three violations of the law.
