MONUMENT UNVEILED.

Warm Hearts in Chilly Air Unveil the Monument of two Brave Men.

As was announced in last week's is sue of the Reporter the unveiling of the monument to Thomas Van Doran and Shadacre took place at three o'clock Saturday afternoon. The air was chilly but about one hundred and fifty warm hearts beat about the monument in "Indian" lane, which leads from the Spring Mills pike below the Old Fort to the road leading from Centre Hill to Spring Mills, while the ceremony was in progress.

D. C. Keller made a short address, setting forth the recently neglected condition of the heroes' graves and the necessity for the work of love that was about to be performed. During the lifetime of Mr. William Hennigh, he said, the graves were given attention and kept well marked, but since that time their location was almost lost sight of. To show that the exact spot of the graves had been found, Mr. Keller exhibited several bones of the head and skull of one of the heroes which were found in digging for the foundation.

The ceremony opened with prayer by Rev. Chilcote, of the Methodist Episcopal church, Centre Hall, which was concluded in a fitting way while Miss Mame Keller, daughter of D. C. Keller, unveiled the monument. Following this came appropriate remarks by Rev. George I. Brown, rector of the St. John's Episcopal church, Bellefonte. "The Star Spangled Banner" was sung by a member of the "Daughters of the American Revolution," a half dozen of whom witne sed the un-

Ex-County Treasurer D. C. Keller is entitled to the credit for having this marker erected. With his own contribution and those he solicited the stone was purchased, besides the time he gave in assisting to erect it and managing for the final unveiling.

Nothing definite is known of the family history of these two men whose bodies lie in "Indian" lane. July 24, 1778, Capt. Potter writes, "Two men went out into the plains a little below his fields and met five Indians whom they engaged. One of the soldiers, Thomas Van Doran was shot dead. hand-to-hand encounter with one of Hamilton. the Indians, and both used their knives; Shadacre killed his antagonist. His fate was hard, for another Indian came up and shot him."
