Methodist Episcopal Church. Easter Sunday, 1901, will ever remain a red-letter day in the history of the Methodist church of Bellefonte. Doubly and trebly important was the day, for not only was it the glad Easter tide but it marked the 84th anniversary of the founding of Methodism in Bellefonte and also was the occasion of the reopening to the public of their beautifully remodeled church which is undoubtedly one of the cosiest and handsomest church

edifices in Central Pennsylvania. 1817-1875-1901 are the important figures in the history of this congregation. 1817 the church was founded here, 1875 the present church was built and 1901 it was again dedicated to the cause of Christ.

The dedicatory sermon was delivered by Bishop Charles H. Fowler D. D. LL. D., of Buffalo, N. Y.

When Rev. Wilford P. Shriner, the present pastor, came to Bellefonte last Spring he at once began to agicate the matter of extensive repairs to the church. He preached a sermon from the pulpit in regard to it and so stirred the people that the matter was at once taken up. Former Governor fair. The repairs cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000, which include also the parsonage which was also completely remodeled throughout. The church is practically a new one.

A fine Hook and Hastings pipe organ has also been placed in the church through the efforts of Mrs. Hastings, wife of former Gov. Hastings. The organ cost \$2,500 and every cent of the money was raised by her from friends in the State, not a dollar coming from the people of Bellefonte. Many of the checks received from her friends were for \$100 each.

MURDERER GULICK CAPTURED.

Returned to the Scene of the Crime at Kline's Grove.

John Gulick, who murdered his mother and brother at Kline's Grove, near Sunbury recently, spent the Easter Day in silent contemplation of his awful crime. The prisoner was found Saturday morning in an old workhouse, near his home, by Butler Surgeon, his father's farm hand.

Gulick was drying his clothes a little stove, in which he had built a fire, when Surgeon entered the place. Trembling with fear Gulick arose and out his hand. He inquired, "How is Pap?" Surgeon replied, "He's well, Work is positively guaranteed. I'll call him."

"No, no, I don't want to see him. The torture I have endured the past few days has made me mad."

"Friday I watched the funerals of mother and my brother from the hills near home. I never saw a newspaper and didn't know anyone was after me.

"I am very sorry, but things were getting too warm for me. It was about three o'clock when I went in the workshop."

"During the day I was in constant fear of some one finding me, and at night the scene of the shooting was always before my eyes."

The prisoner was pale and careworn, but seemed to breathe easier after being placed behind the prison bars.
