AN ARMY SURGEON and an expert in insanity who was sent to the Philippines to investigate the reported prevalence of insanity among American soldiers, reports that the number of cases has been much exaggerated. The cases are generally of a curable type, and Surgeon Latimer attributes almost all of them to melancholy, superinduced by the nature of the service and the climatic conditions. Most of the volunteers are young, and went to Manila under the idea that they would have much of pleasant and romantic adventure, whereas they are chiefly employed in the dull routine of duty, alternately drenched with rain or dew and exposed to the fierce heat of the sun. All the cases yield readily to treatment, but the best, which he recommends, is to bring them home and muster them out of service after re-establishing their health.

THE REPORT GOES that Senator Hanna is making terms for the disposal of his large holdings in lake freighters and ore and coal lands, that he may hereafter devote his entire attention to political and administrative matters, otherwise the making and moving of presidents, governors and senators. He has recently attempted to manage and direct the election of four United States senators in Delaware and Nebraska. He failed in Delaware, while in Nebraska the result is in doubt. It is further stated Mr. Hanna in closing out his industrial and corporation deals is holding himself in reserve for a move on the presidential nomination in 1904. The people of this country, even those who rejoice over his successes, are in no doubt about the man. He is a political plutocrat and the agent of plutocrats, wielding the mighty power of aggregated wealth, without scruples or conscience, in the fields of political activity.

IT IS AN INDIRECT way of checking the granting of fraudulent pensions that Secretary Root has ordered that every man in the force of 35,000 volunteers who are to be mustered out before July 1 shall be subjected to a searching medical examination when he leaves the service of the United States. The instructions issued from the war department are positive and stringent. They require a strict investigation to be made of the physical condition of all soldiers and officers of the line below the rank of general. The results of this investigation are to be placed on the army records, which are to be open for reference to the pension officials whenever any of the discharged volunteers apply for a pension on the ground of disability contracted in the Philippines or elsewhere. The necessity for this is shown by the fact that nearly 40,000 pension claims have already been filed by volunteers who served during the war with Spain—most of whom never left American soil or heard a gun fired in battle during that conflict.

THERE WAS AN INTERESTING ending of the long struggle for the election of two United States senators from Nebraska at the closing session of the Legislature on Thursday. All the candidates who have been balloted for in caucuses were abandoned, and two new men elected senators, one for the long term of six years and the other for four years. Governor Dietrich, who was chosen governor last November by a plurality of 800 in a total vote of 241,000, gets the short term, and J. H. Millard, Omaha, the long term. The peculiarity of the election is that both the new senators are presidents of National banks. Both men are new names in Nebraska politics. The railroads could not agree on candidates, and it is a supposable case the senators-elect are acceptable to the corporation interest. The election in Nebraska leaves but two seats vacant in the United States Senate—those from Delaware—and it is surmised that as soon as the Republicans can heal their factional feuds, which Hanna has in charge, an extra session of the Legislature will be called to make good those vacancies.
