A HOPEFUL DEMOCRACY.

The Democratic State Convention, in spite of all its factional disputes, has bravely met the public expectation in its action upon the issues of the hour, and has made possible an earnest and hopeful campaign for the restoration of honest government.

Waiving all questions of national politics, the convention makes its appeal directly to all honest citizens to unite "for the redemption of our Commonwealth from the political freebooters who now control it." No language can be too strong to describe the depth of prostitution into which the political control of Pennsylvania has sunk, or the wide extent of its infamy, and this denunciatory platform is a summons to all patriotic people to join their efforts for its overthrow.

The distracting question of the organization in Philadelphia was wisely dealt with, in a way that ought to secure a united party. In any case, the one issue before the people is so commanding importance and is so broadly declared, that no professing Democrat can have excuse for holding aloof, and the convention did not hesitate to denounce, with unmistakable emphasis, the false Democrats who have betrayed their party to serve the Republican machine.

The nomination of Judge Yerkes for the Supreme Court and of Mr. Palm for State Treasurer is entirely in accord with the declarations of the platform, and the call for union and co-operation. They are men above fact or personal control.

Senate, in which body he was the leading spirit in bringing about the passage of the bill which provided for the erection of the State Hospital for the Insane at Norristown. In 1883 he was elected Judge of the Court of Common Pleas, and he was re-elected in 1893. None of his decisions has ever been directly reversed by the Supreme Court. He has attended several Democratic national and State conventions as a delegate.

In the Democratic State convention of 1899 Judge Yerkes was one of the leading candidates for the nomination for Justice of the Supreme Court and he came within a few votes of securing that distinction, which after a memorable struggle, involving twenty-eight ballots in a convention lasting two days, was awarded to Stephen Leslie Mestrezat, of Fayette county.

Andrew J. Palm, the nominee for State Treasurer, is a member of the State House of Representatives from Crawford county. During the last session of the Legislature he was a prominent figure on the Democratic side of the House, and made an enviable record for standing up for the principles of his party and against the dominant element in the General Assembly. He was born at Sheakleyville in 1848, and raised on a farm. After receiving an academic education, for which he paid out of the proceeds of his labor, he became school teacher. Subsequently he was principal of the New Lebanon Academy, and Superintendent of Public Schools of Mercer county.

Mr. Palm was editor of the Mercer Press for several years and also of the Educational Review, of Pittsburgh. He founded the American Journal of Politics in 1892, and from 1894 to 1897 he was editor of the Meadville Messenger. Mr. Palm is the author of a book entitled "The Death Penalty," of which several editions have been published. He was elected to the House of Representatives in 1898, and re-elected on a fusion ticket in 1900.
