Mr. and Mrs. Ralston, of State College, were guests in this community recently.

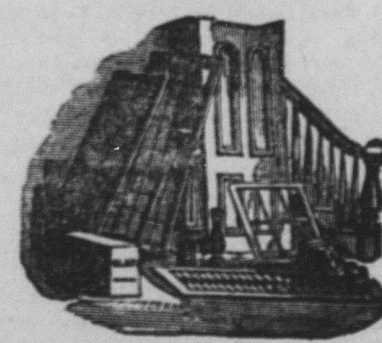
Frank Richardson, of Spring Mills, was the guest of his sister, Mrs. Luther Royer, Sunday.
