The Legislature of Kentucky has passed a law and I sent it to the governor for his approval taking from the women of the State the right to vote in school trustee elections. PENROSE'S DECEPTION.

Senator Penrose, the Junior Pennsylvania United States Senator, is practicing deception, but it is so shallow that his intention is not hard to discover. He introduced an amendment to the pending bill changing the Constitution so as to provide for the election of the United States Senators by a direct vote of the people. Penrose's proposition is of wider scope than was anticipated; it not only proposes a radical change in the Constitution, but a change also in the basis of State representation in the Senate. It provides that all States shall have at least two Senators, but that additional Senators shall be elected for every 500,000 of population, thus enabling the great States like Pennsylvania and New York to have big delegations in both Houses.

Unfortunately for the purpose of the Pennsylvania Senator, his amendment aims at a portion of the Constitution which, authorities on the subject declare, is not amendable. No one believes that Penrose himself expects the amendment to be adopted, therefore the conclusion is general that he has offered it to make more difficult the passage of the bill giving the voters the right to choose their Senators. The whole truth about this bill is that so far as the Senate is concerned no one favors it. For the purpose of appearing to endorse it, it is favorably reported in every Congress and nothing further is done with it. The House has passed the bill several times and Senators have declared their approval of it, but they always stop short of enacting it into law. Many Senators will feel grateful to Penrose, because his proposition further complicates matters and makes it easier to avoid action.
