"I suppose," said the stranger, observing his emotion, "this is the spot where you lost your leg while fighting for your country."

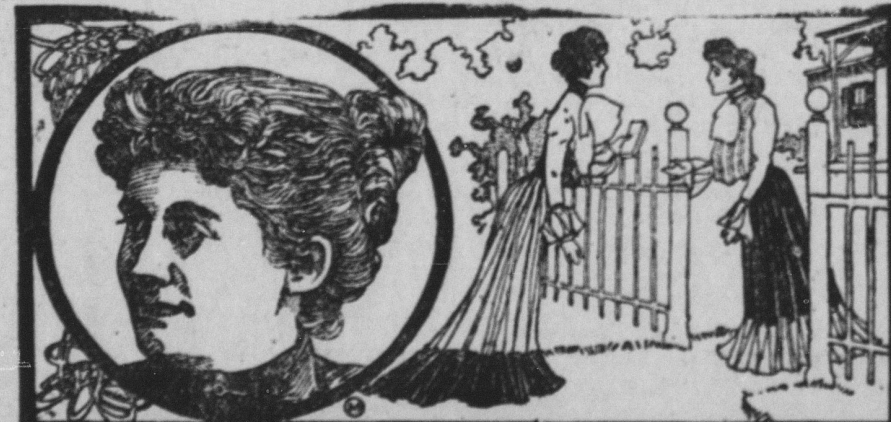
"No," said the old soldier. "I lost my leg in a sawmill in Kansas on the 11th day of May 1877. This is the place where I got scared and ran like the devil."
