Bradstreet's says: Business is ahead of last year and still expanding. This is indicated by the reports received from Eastern and Western trade centers...

Latest News of Pennsylvania Told in Short Order.

Two bills of interest to fishermen were introduced in the House. One from Mr. Mayne, of Lehigh, imposes a fine of \$50 for every offense for trespassing on private lands for the purpose of fishing...

The bill to incorporate filtration companies, which was ruthlessly slaughtered in the House, will have another chance. Mr. Plummer privately explained to those who voted against the bill that it was of an entirely innocent character and meant only to incorporate filtration companies...

The heavy whistles of three large breakers sounded the curfew to the children of Wilkesbarre at 9 o'clock Friday night for the first time. The new law compels all children under 14 to be off the streets by 9 unless accompanied by their parents or guardians...

A photograph of himself, which Henry Hughes, 18 years old, left in the home of James Peacock, near Lancasterville, led to his arrest charged with burglary. A week ago Hughes turned up at the Peacock home and was given shelter over night. About 2 o'clock in the morning after he left Mrs. Peacock was awakened by some one forcing a shutter. She was afraid to arouse her husband, thinking that he might be shot...

William Ziekman, who worked as a non-union man during the strike, died at Pottsville. Because of cool treatment of some of his former friends, he began to work at Pottsville, and finally became violently insane, refusing nourishment and starving to death. Mrs. Mary A. White, of Hollidaysburg died on the street while on her way from a store. Mojento Makovitt, a domestic of Sharon, blew out the gas when she retired and was found dead in bed.

Washington police started a crusade against loafers. Eight offenders arrested were found guilty for fined. Four paid their fines and four took jail sentences. Mark and Herbert Mathers have begun a \$10,000 damage suit against the Ellsworth Coal Company, at Washington, for false arrest on a charge of firing a barn owned by the coal company at Ellsworth.

W. H. McCracken, of Richhill, Green county, is under arrest, charged with assisting his sister, Miss Lottie McCracken, a school teacher, to chastise Edward Hedley, aged 12, for misbehavior. The boy is alleged to have been seriously hurt. Scarlet fever is raging in Indiana, and one of the primary rooms in the public schools has been closed.

H. T. Powell, of East Palestine, has brought suit against the McNabb Coal Company for \$7500 damages for injuries received by an explosion of gas in the mine. In court at Ebensburg, Frank Roberts and John Mountain, convicted burglars, were sentenced to 12 years and six months, and 2 years and 6 months, respectively, in the Western penitentiary. Providing for the annexation of any city, borough, township or part of a township, to a contiguous city. This is known as the "Greater Pittsburg" bill.
