International Lesson Comments for March 22.

Subject: Paul's Message to the Ephesians, Eph., ii., 1-10-Golden Tex*, Eph. il., 3-Memory Verses, 4-7-Commentary on the Day's Lesson.

1. The children of wrath (vs. 1-3). 1. "And you." A= Christ fills the whole body of Christian believers with His fulness (chap. 1: 23), so had He dealt with the con-verted Ephesians who before were dead in trespasses and sins. "Quickened." Made alive spiritually. "Dead." See Col. 2:13. Death is often used by all writers and in all nations to express a state of extreme misnations to express a state of extreme mis-ery. The Ephesians by trespassing and sinning had brought themselves into a state of deplorable wretchedness, as had all the heathen nations, and having thus sinned against God they were condemned by Him and might be considered as "dead by Him and might be considered as "dead in law." They were incapable of perform-ing any legal act and were always hable to the punishment of death which they had deserved and which was ready to be in-flicted upon them. They were incapable of performing a holy act. Their bodies were the living coffins in which their dead souls were buried. "Trespasses and sins." Trespasses may signify the slightest devia-tions from the right: sins more habitual and daring transgressions, but the terms and daring transgressions, but the terms

and daring transgressions, but the terms run together in meaning. 2. "Ye walked" They had sinned con-tinually, not merely occasionally They lived in sin and followed the evil practices of the heathen world. True Christians separate themselves from the world (Rom. 12: 2; 2 Cor. 6: 14-18) and do not conform to its sinful externs and unations. "Prince 12: 2; 2 Cor. 6: 14-18) and do not conform to its sinful customs and practices. "Prince -air." This has reference to Satan, the prince of devils. He is also "the god of this world" (2 Cor. 4: 4). The air is repre-sented as the seat of his kingdom. The devil seems to have some power in the lower region of the air; he is at hand to tempt men and to do as much mischief to the world as he can. We live in an atmos-phere poisonous and impregnated with deadly elements. "Of the spirit." As the Holy Spirit works that which is good in obedient souls so Satan works that which obedient souls so Satan works that which is evil in wicked hearts. He is prince of the spirit that, not only in Paul's day but even now, "worketh in the sons of disobedience.

even how, "worketh in the sons of disobe-dience." 3. "We also." Paul here changes from the second to the first person, putting him-self in with those whom he has just de-scribed. "All." They lived in sin and walked in sin. and sin was interwoven in their very being. "It tinged every temper. polluted every faculty, and perverted every transac-tion of life." "Lusts." "Fulfiling," etc. They lived in the actual commission of all those sins which their corrupt natures inclined them to commit. "Mind." Thoughts; mental suggestions "Mind." "Mind." Nature. in Greek, implies that which has grown in us as the peculiarity of our being, as distinguished from that which has been wrought in us by more external influwrought in us by mere external influ-ences. Here is an incidental proof of the doctrine of original sin. "Of wrath." The child of anything is one connected with The partaking of, or exposed to anything. The children of wrath are those who live in open disobedience (v. 2) and are thus ex-posed to the wrath of God. See Rom. posed 2: 5-9.

Three words are especially emphasized-God. mercy, grace. "Rich in mercy." God is rich in many things besides mercy. He is rich in worlds; He owns the gold and silver in a thousand hills, as well as the cattle on them. But while a knowledge these riches is not necessary to our salva these riches is not necessary to our salva tion, it is necessary that we know about the riches of His mercy. See Ex. 33: 19; Psa. 85: 10; Isa. 55: 7 and many other Scrintures. God is rich in pity and com-passion for the sinner. "Great love." His infinite love for us is the ground of our sal-vation. He loved us and died for us while we were yet sinners. "Together with Christ." God has given us as complete a resurrection from the death of sin to a life of righteousness as the body of Christ has had from the grave. See Rom. 8: 11. has had from the grave. See Rom S: 11. "Grace." Unmerited favor. Their salva-tion was not of themselves (v. 8) -- "not the mere product of any natural abilities or any merit of their own." neither was it by works (v. 9), but it was through the lo mercy and grace of God. "Saved." Not merely saved from sin-justified and sanc-tified-but gloriously saved from death, the devil and hell; saved to resurrection. Christ and glory, in the full view of the endless ages to come. These people were saved at this time, and so we see there is such a thing as salvation from sin in this "Raised-sit." Believers are citizens of heaven and have their places assigned there, which they will soon take possession of (Phil. 3: 20, 21). But this may be un-derstood as referring to sanctified souls in this life. Having been raised from the death of sin, we enter into a beavenly union with Christ, and the soul is inde-scribahly happy in His love. It is heaven bern below 7.9 "Ages to come," etc. What God had done for the sinners at Ephesus would be proof of His great goodness and mercy and serve as an encouragement to sinners in all ages of the world. COMMERCIAL REVIEW.

Ceneral Trade Conditions.

Bradstreet's says: Business is ahead of last year and still expanding. This is indicated by the reports received from Eastern and Western trade centers, and is confirmed by the largest bank clearings on record and enormous gross railway earnings. Southern trade and crop preparations are dulled or retarded by heavy rains and

rising rivers, but it is to be noted that despite this influence receipts of cotton are heavier than a year ago and had some influence in bringing about a reaction in cotton prices during the week

Special activity is noted by jobbers in all lines of wearing apparel, dry goods, clothing, shoes, millinery, hats and caps, and retail trade in these lines is also expanding. Active preparations for a heavy season's building are indicated by a large demand for lumber, light and heavy hardware, paints and glass. There is also a strong tone to iron and steel. Finished products are in increased demand, and as a result of inquiry cruder forms, both of domestic and foreign manufacture, are firmer in tone

The strength of the raw product throughout most of the week exercised an influence on cotton goods, which reached the highest prices in years, further advances being noted in bleached cottons with a firmer ten-dency in print cloths. The jobbing trade the country over appears to be enjoying an exceptionally active business in dry goods.

The iron and steel demand is improving and prices are hardening. A large business has been done in rails, structural plates, sheets, wire and tin plates. It is to be noted that the advance of last week in wire has not discouraged. Structural material is very active. Foreign iron and steel are notably firmer in price. German interests seem to have disposed of their surplus, prices abroad are firmer and a much larger business could be done if prices were a little lower. Imports for January are fully six times as large

as in the same month a year ago. Business failures in the United States for the week ending with March 5 number 171, against 185 last week, 204 in the like week of 1902, 173 in 1901, 208 in 1900 and 189 in 1899.

Short Order.

Two bills of interest to fishermen were introduced in the House. One rom Mr. Mayne, of Lehigh, impose: a fine of \$50 for every offense for tres passers on private lands for the pur pose of fishing. The other, by Mr lames, of Lackawanna, requires fisher nen from other States who bring their boats into the waters of this State to fish to take out a license under penalty of \$50. The latter affects only the lake fishing in lakes of 500 acres or more

The bill to incorporate filtration companies, which was ruthlessly slaughtered in the House, will have an other chance. Mr. Plummer privately explained to those who voted agains the bill that it was of an entirely inno cent character and meant only to incor porate filtration companies, which are not included in the corporation act and that there was nothing in it but what was shown upon its face. After this explanation, on motion of Mr. Plummer, the vote by which the bill was defeated was reconsidered and furconsideration was postponed for the present.

The heavy whistles of three large breakers sounded the curfew to the children of Wilkesbarre at 9 o'clock Friday night for the first time. The new law compels all children under 14 to be off the streets by 9 unless accompanied by their parents or guardians Mayor Price's instructions to the police were to make no arrests but to warn children found out and escort them to their homes. A second offense will mean arrests and the children and their parents will be compelled to pay a fine. Whistles at each end of the city and in the heart of it gave loud warn ing, blowing for several minutes and they could be heard all over the city. The authorities are confident there will be but little violation of the law, the two weeks' notice given having been sufficient to warn all the parents and children.
