

She dropped the glass kerosene lamp, which exploded, throwing the blazing oil about the stairway. Her husband responded to her screams for assistance. Despite his efforts she was burned from head to foot and is dying at the Pottsville Hospital. Schwartz was also badly burned While he was extinguishing his wife's blazing garments a plaintive wail from the bedroom reminded him of the infant's danger. The stairs were all ablaze by this time. He broke through the wall of flame and rescued the child

The execution was car-ried out with remarkable celerity, and Hays was pronounced dead in nine and one-half minutes after the drop fell The crime for which Hays was hange was the murder of Edward Perkins, col ored, at Masontown, November 14, 1902.
