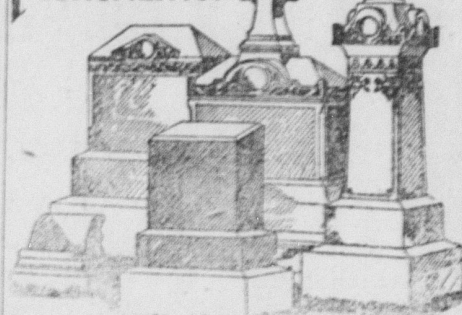

Charles Frankenberger was stung in the face while working around a beehive.

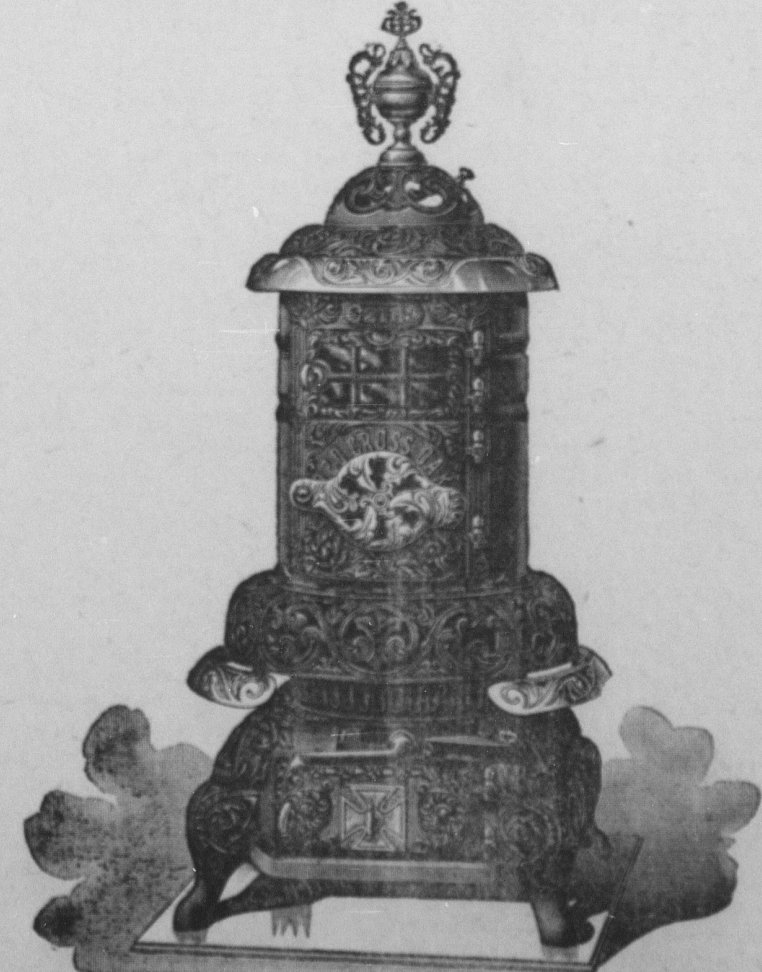
