Big tiame. The hunters of Boalsburg and vicinity have had very good success during the past week. The place has al-

ways been noted for good marksmen for the past few generations, and the young men of the community are adding lustre to the record of the Rileys, et al.

Thursday of last week a mixed party of hunters from Boalsburg, Linden Hall and Branch killed two deer. The killing was done by George Meyer, of Linden Hall, and Harry Miller, of the Branch. The former put the last bullet into the deer wounded by Miller. A third deer was killed by a Mr. Lightner, of Stone Valley, who happened to be in the same vicinity. These deer were slaughtered near the tram road along Laurel Run.

Saturday a small party of Boalsburg hunters went to the mountains immediately opposite that place, and killed two deer. The sportsmen who killed them were Homer Barr and Samuel Bailey.

It seems that in that neighborhood deer travel in lots of threes, for after the two deer above mentioned were slaughtered, Will Raymond seriously wounded deer number three.

Safe Cracked at Salona.

Safe crackers got their destructive work in on the safe in the hardware store of George W. Esenwine, at Salona, Wednesday night of last week. but got nothing of value for their trouble, except a number of notes and bankable paper. before, about \$200, and kept it at his home. Entrance was gained to the room by forcing the front window with a chisel.

With a monkey wrench they twisted off the knob or handle to the door of the safe, and boring the hole deeper, inserted an explosive and blew the door off.

The notes secured were to the value of \$300 and \$400. Some were endorsed by Mr. Esseuwine, and others were bankable.

Bridge Bill Unconstitutional.

Judge Jacobs, of Dauphin county, dismissed the mandamus proceedings brought against the Board of Public Property to compel the State to pay its share of building a bridge over the Susquehanna river at Lewisburg.

The court decides that the act of 1901, relating to the building of bridges across streams between two counties, is unconstitutional.

This bill was one of the pet measures of State Senator B. K. Focht, of Lewisburg.


