Court Refuses to Allow Case Involving Valuable Coal Lands to Come to Trial. The suit of the heirs of Burkhard Moser against the Lehigh Coal & Navi-

gation Company for 273 acres of coal lands in Schuvlkill county, valued at \$1,250,000, was thrown out of court Monday by Judge Bechtel.

The heirs claimed that Burkhard Moser acquired the land in 1788 and held it until the time of his death in 1832 The Lehigh Coal Company acquired possession by a title from the Commonwealth in 1864 and held the property ever since. Part of the town of Tamaqua was involven in the suit.

The Moser heirs number several hundred persons, a number of whom live in Centre county, who have been fighting for a long time in the courts of Schuylkill and Berks counties, with the hope of securing the property.

The matter came before the court in the form of a bill in equity. The court decided that this is not the proper way to bring suit and sustained the demurrer of the defendant's attorneys.

Following the suggestion of Judge Bechtel, in his opinion in the equity proceedings, the attorneys for the Moser heirs are now preparing to bring ejectment proceedings against the company.
