Hydrophobia a Real Disease.

Despite the fact that denials have been made by various physicians of the existence of hydrophobia, several prominent members of the medical profession, at a meeting of the County Medical Society of the College of Physicians, declared that the disease has a "pathological entity," and should be so recognized. Dr. G. Morton Illman presented a paper entitled "A Report of a Case of Hydrophobia, with Au topsy." Dr. Illman described the symptoms as exhibited in the case and maintained that hydrophobia exists as a separate disease, with pecu liar symptoms, and he asserted that it is a grave error to call it excessive hysteria, as has frequently been done Dr. M. P. Ravenel of the Veterinary department of the university said, in discussing the subject: "I have per sonally experimented on 150 cases of animals which I inoculated with the germs of rabies, and I found that the brain in each case showed the same symptoms, and these symptoms have been found in no other diseases."-Philadelphia Inquirer.



The possibility that the cotton manufacturers of the world are facing the prospect of a dearth of raw material seems to have excited the people of Paraguay. Cotton grows wild in that country, and the cultivated product, though different from ours, has a long and fine staple.

As in Peru, the plant is a small tree rather than a little bush, and it lives and produces for several years. European manufacturers have reported good results from its use. The Paraguayans, however, have never given much attention to its cultivation.

The newspapers of Asuncion have uddenly awakered to the opportunities presented, and have risen to the occasion. "They are offering many suggestions to the government and assert that cotton will yet place Paraguay on the high road to prosperity.

They ask the government to employ the services of men of science, like Dr. Bertoni, to prepare pamphlets for distribution in the cotton trade of Great Britain, France and Germany, descriptive of the nature and qualities of Paraguayan cotton and the facili ties for producing large supplies of it. They ask that Dr. Bertoni, Mr. Anisits and other experts be engaged to make a survey of the lands adapted to cotton cultivation in the republic; also that the government print and distrib ute among the farmers of the lowlands the best information as to the methods of cotton-raising.

We may in a short time export \$100,000,000 worth of cotton in a year." announces the enthusiastic Paraguay, a German weekly published at Asun clon.



Gold watch cases are so'd by weight, and no one can see where this lead is secreted until the springs of the case are taken out and the lead will be found secreted behind

These cases are made by companies who profess to be honest, but furnish the means to the dishonest to rob the public. It is not pleasant for anyone to find that he has lugged a lump of lead in his watch case.

Another trick of the makers of sourious solid gold watch cases is to stamp the case "U. S. Assay." The United States does not stamp any article made out of gold and silver except coin, and the fakir, by using this stamp, wants to make the public be-lieve that the Government had something to do with the stamping or guaranteeing the fineness of watch cases.

Another trick of the watch fakir is to advertise a watch described as a solid advertise a watch described as a solid gold filled watch with a twenty or twenty-five-year guarantee. These watches are gener-ally sent C. O. D., and if the purchaser has paid for the watch he finds that the company which guaranteed the watch to wear is not in existence.

The Dueber-Hampden Watch Company, of Canton, Ohio, who are constantly ex-posing these frauds, will furnish the names of the manufacturers who are in this questionable business.
