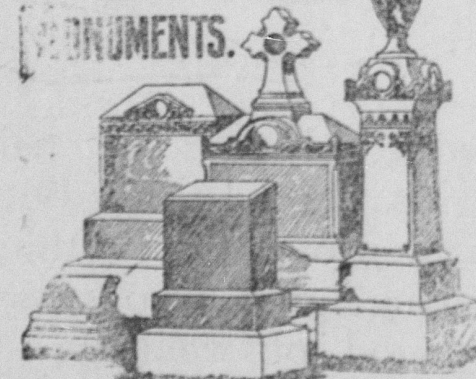

WILL BORE FOR OIL.

The Penns Valley Oil and Mfg Co. Seeking Favorable Location to Sink a Well.

The diamond drill will penetrate the earth in Penns Valley in search of oil, coal and minerals.
Mr. Lewis, the contractor for the Penns Valley Oil and Manufacturing Company, in company with W. B. Mingle, Esq., of Centre Hall, Wednesday morning drove over a portion of the leased territory with a view of determining the point where the first drilling shall be done.
The company will employ the most skilled workmen and modern drilling machinery, which will enable search to be made to a great depth if necessary. Failure of discovery is often due to the limited capital of the prospectors or the antiquated machinery employed, but neither of these will be an obstacle in the way of the corporation named here.

The organization of the Penns Valley Oil and Manufacturing Company was largely, if not solely, due to the efforts of W. B. Mingle, Esq., who has been in touch with men well acquainted with the oil business and development of oil fields, for several years. The corporation is chartered under the laws of Delaware, and has a capitalization of \$100,000. Hon. Wm. M. Allison, Esq., of Spring Mills; W. B. Mingle, Esq., of Centre Hall, and W. Frank Bradford, of Centre Hall, are the only parties in the valley who are financially interested.

Within the past year, Mr. Mingle, acting under the instructions of the corporation, leased eight thousand acres of land, covering various farms and timberlands between Linden Hall and Woodward, and it is the desire of the corporation to lease adjacent territory.
Whether or not there is oil, coal or valuable minerals hidden under the surface in Penns Valley is, of course a question. If the finding of oil or minerals were a certainty, every one would make an effort to secure it. Here is a corporation willing to use its funds in search of a treasure—help it along. How? Invest your money? No; you are not asked to do that, but give a lease of your land. If oil or minerals are found, you will be the richer for the find; if nothing of value is discovered, you have lost nothing.

DANIEL HESS DEAD.

A Leading Citizen in Harris Township Laid to Rest Tuesday

Daniel Hess died Sunday morning, at 7:30 o'clock, at his home at Linden Hall, at the age of eighty-five years, five months and five days.
The funeral ceremony took place on Tuesday, Rev. J. I. Stonecypher, of the Boalsburg Lutheran church officiating. Interment was made at Boalsburg.
The pall bearers were Messrs. John, Frank, Clyde and Calvin Wieland, Eugene Helms and Albert Allen.

The deceased is survived by his wife, who before marriage was Miss Drusilla Christina Wieland, and one daughter, Lizzie, wife of T. C. Helms, of Osceola. Two sons, Edward and Albert, are dead. Two brothers—Samuel and Emanuel Hess, of Iowa City, Iowa, also survive.
The deceased had been in his usual health and retained his mental faculties up to within a short time of his death. A hard fall on the ice, mention of which was made in these columns, was the beginning of his last illness.

Mr. Hess was born in Aaronsburg, October 15, 1818. His first business venture was at Spring Mills, where, after a long clerkship with the Duncans, he became a member of the firm, which partnership was later dissolved. After a period of retirement, covering a year or more, on account of poor health, Mr. Hess moved to Linden Hall, and in 1859 began a general mercantile business.
He was favorably situated during war times, which followed shortly after, and his business ability and keen foresight repeatedly pointed out opportunities to make large margins in various deals. These opportunities were never turned down. Mr. Hess was a man of correct habits, economical and indefatigable in business; a man who jealously guarded his credit and made his word equal to a bond. These traits were not without their reward, for Mr. Hess became one of the most wealthy men in Penns Valley.

Mr. Hess retired from the mercantile business in 1883, but managed his own financial affairs until the last.
Through the instrument of a will, he left to his widow the major portion of his wealth, not forgetting his only daughter, Mrs. Helms. Miss Freda Hess, a grand-daughter, through this will comes into possession of a good share outright, an after the death of Mrs. Hess is made the chief heir of the estate.
