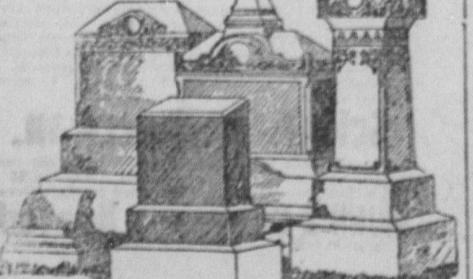

DR. R. J. YOUNG ARRESTED.

Snow Shoe Doctor Charged With False Imprisonment and Perjury.

On information sworn to Monday before Justice John Keichline, of Bellefonte, Dr. R. J. Young, a well known physician of Snow Shoe, was arrested at the instance of Father Victor Zarek, pastor of the Polish Catholic church at Clarence, charging the former with false imprisonment and perjury. Dr. Young will be given a hearing before Squire Keichline next Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. This case is the aftermath coming from the recent arrest of Father Zarek, charged with having whipped sixteen years old Andrew Sofko, of Clarence, thus causing his death. At a habeus corpus proceeding held before Judge Love. Father Zarek was discharged as there was no evidence whatever to substantiate the allegation. It was alleged by Dr. Young that young Sofko had made a statement implicating the priest, this it is claimed is false. Father Zarek is now seeking a full vindication from all these charges.

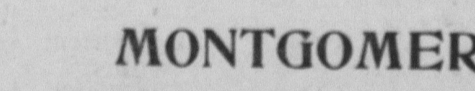
