TEN MEN KILLED BY GAS

To the regret of the officials here Fifty Men Were Riding Through Tunnel When They Were Overcome.

ALL WERE RENDERED UNCONSCIOUS.

Mysterlous Fatality in a Tunnel of the Summit Branch Cost Company-According to Custom the Men Were Behind One of the Little Mine Locomotives When Discovery Was Made.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., (Special). - A telegram received at the Susquehanna Coal Company's offices in this city states that ten miners were suffocated by gas and sulphur fumes from a small locomotive in the workings of the Summit Branch Coal Company at Williamstown, Dauphin county.

The accident was one of the most peculiar in the history of the anthracite mines, and no reason for it can be assigned by the officials.

The victims include Michael Golden, general inside foreman of the company, and nine miners and laborers.
