POMONA GRANGE. Second Quarterly Session Held at Pleasant Gap, Friday, May 27.

The Centre County Pomona Grange held its second quarterly meeting in the hall of Logan Grange, Pleasant Gap, Friday, May 27th.

The meeting was unusually well attended and great interest was manifested. Since January three new Granges were organized, one at Pine Grove Mills, one at Rock Springs and one at Oak Grove, east of Bellefonte.

Worthy Master George Dale presided; meeting opened promptly at 10 a. m. Willard Dale delivered the address of welcome on behalf of Logan Grange, which was responded to by A. O. Tyeon, master of Washington Grange. Mrs. Daniel Grove then read a paper on the Grange and the Public Schools.

E. K. Smith, of Oak Hall, opened the question of the advantages of a system of correspondence schools of agriculture, which discussion was participated in by a number of members. After this a recess was taken for dinner, Logan Grange having prepared a bounteous feast which, of course, was participated in by all.

During the recess a large number of the members visited the newly established State Fishery. The Grange reconvened at 1:30 when the question of the trade advantages of the Grange was taken up by Leonard Rhone and others, showing that it was no longer necessary for farmers to purchase implements through three and four hands, saving the commission of a large number of unnecessary agents.

James A. Keller, secretary, submitted the report of the Grange Fire Insurance Company, showing that the company had gained \$114,000 insurance since the January meeting, and that the entire average cost of insurance did not exceed 18 cents a hundred annually. The company now carries insurance amounting to \$4,700,000.

Leonard Rhone, chairman, submitted the report of the Grange Encampment, stating that many improvements were in progress on the camp ground, that the numerous trees set out this spring were well started; hereafter the camp would be provided with entire new furniture for the accommodation of the tent holders; that several hundred new folding lawn seats, folding tables and folding cots were in process of construction which would enable the association to discard the old and undesirable outfits.

The Encampment will open Saturday, the 17th of September continuing and including Friday, the 23rd. The discriminations in the assessment and collection of taxes was next taken up and ably discussed by L. Rhone, J. A. Keller, George L. Goodhart, James Gilliland, Hiram Thompson and others. The discussion developed the fact that the tax on real estate in the Commonwealth averaged 16 mills and the average tax on personal and corporate property was only 3 mills. That the investor in real estate would be taxed \$16 per thousand while the investor in bonds and mortgages was taxed only \$4 per thousand.

The discussion also brought out the fact that there were gross discriminations in the assessment of property by the assessors. Very often in farms side by side there was a discrimination of five to ten dollars per acre.

Miss Anna Dale gave an interesting relation on the Parson's Wayward Son. A vote of thanks was tendered Logan Grange for its hospitality, and after the transaction of much other business the County Grange adjourned to meet in the hall of Washington Grange near State College in August.

Spring Mills. Memorial Day was observed with an elaborate patriotic display. Business was generally suspended. The local Grand Army Post assisted by the Spring Mills, I. O. O. F. Lodge No. 597 and the Sunday school children, decorated the graves.

Especially impressive services were held at 6:30 p. m., in the Presbyterian church where a large concourse of people was gathered. T. M. Gramley was chairman of the meeting. At the opening of the services a beautiful duet, entitled "Across the Vale," was rendered by Miss Rena Shires and B. Frank Kennedy. After prayer by Rev. W. C. Bierly, Hon. John G. Love, of Bellefonte, delivered the oration which was timely and brilliant.

The I. O. O. F. Lodge, which was organized only a year ago, made their first appearance on parade. They are to be congratulated on their growth and advancement. Wm. Fleisher and wife visited at the former's parental home, at Tusseyville, over Sunday.

DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION. Meets June 7th—Primaries Saturday Previous—Appointment of Delegates. The Democratic voters of Centre county will meet at the regular places for holding the general elections, in their respective election districts, on Saturday, June 4th, to elect delegates to the County Convention, under the rules of the party, the officers for holding the primaries, will consist of the committeeman and two assistants in each district, and the election will be opened at 3 o'clock P. M., and close at 7 o'clock P. M.

The delegates chosen at the above stated time will meet in the Court House, Bellefonte, Tuesday, June 7th, at 12 o'clock noon, and nominate one candidate for the office of President Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Centre county, two candidates for Assembly, one candidate for the office of District Attorney, one candidate for the office of County Surveyor, said delegates so chosen will also at the same time elect three conferees to the next Congressional conference of the Congressional district of which Centre county forms a part; a chairman of the County Committee to serve from the 1st day of January 1905 to the 1st day of January 1906, and transact such other business as may come before the Convention.
