THE KEYSTONE STATE

Latest News of Pennsylvania Told in Short Order.

Attorney General Carson gave State Highway Commissioner Hunter an opinion upon the question whether or not the State is liable to pay any part of the damages sustained by abutting property owners in the rebuilding, relocation or changing of grade of any highway, in accordance with the provisions of the act of April 15, 1903. The Attorney General says: "The legislative intent is clearly stated. It provides a legal method of ascertaining the measure of damages ascertained and specifies the parties thereto. Among these parties the State is not included, presumably for the reason that the matter is a local one, and, therefore, is to be dealt with by the local authorities, but when such damages have been legally ascertained and paid by the respective counties, which alone are liable for them, it is the duty of the commissioners of highways to include such damages in the total cost of the improvement and upon the completion of the road to apportion the total expenses as provided in Section 7."

Charles Lockhart, a director of the Standard Oil Company and at one time president of the corporation, died at his residence in Pittsburgh after an illness of several months, due to the infirmities of old age. Mr. Lockhart was one of the oil kings of the country, and with John D. Rockefeller, William G. Warden and Henry M. Flagler laid the foundation for the Standard Oil Company. He was also a director of the Western Union Telegraph Company, president of the Pittsburgh National Bank of Commerce, and was founder of the International Navigation Company, which controls the Red Star Line of steamers plying between New York and England. His wealth was estimated at \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000.

As a result of revelations in connection with the failure of the International Cream Separator Company, one of Lancaster's big industries, it is asserted that loans were improperly made by the City Savings & Trust Co., which closed its doors last week. The Separator Company was indebted to the City Savings & Trust Co. for \$80,000, more than half of the latter's capital stock. One of the trust company's directors said that the heavy loans were made, altogether without the knowledge of the Board of Directors. Loans of this kind are usually announced at the Board of Directors' meeting, the directors being required to investigate the safety of the proposed loans.

The village of Stockton was visited by a destructive fire at an early hour the other morning. About 1:30 A. M. fire was discovered in the general store of A. L. Davison and before any help could be obtained the entire building was destroyed. As there is no fire companies in Stockton word was telephoned to Lambertville for assistance. The Columbia chemical engine responded, arriving about 5 A. M., on a special train. At that time eight buildings had been destroyed. Through the heroic efforts of the firemen the flames were gotten under control. The loss, estimated between \$30,000 and \$40,000, is partly covered by insurance.

The State Live Stock Breeders' Association, at its annual meeting in Harrisburg, appointed a committee to cooperate with representatives of the dairy and agricultural interests of Pennsylvania to prevent the proposed repeal of the Grout law taxing colored oleomargarine. The following officers were elected: President, W. C. Norton, Aldenville; first vice-president, Dr. Leonard Pearson Philadelphia; second vice-president, M. P. Shoemaker, Greensburg; secretary, E. S. Bayard, Pittsburg; treasurer, J. F. Lantz, Glenmore.

The bill creating a department of public printing and authorizing the Governor to appoint a superintendent for four years at \$3000 a year passed the legislature. The purpose of the bill is to take the place of the present obsolete law governing the State printing, which does not provide for the present modern methods of type composition and printing.

To induce the members of the graduating class of the Pottsville High School to wear caps and gowns when they graduate next June a conference was held between Superintendent Kupert and School Directors Wanger and Wells, and the members of the class. Mr. Wells, who originated the movement, urged the graduates to wear caps and gowns, saying they could be made for \$3. The young women asserted that caps and gowns could not be secured for less than \$6, and refused to wear them unless they are furnished by the School Board. They refused to wear caps and gowns at their class night exercises and resented the attempts of the board to dictate to them the nature of the costumes they should wear. The young women are supported in their stand by the young men, who are also averse to wearing caps and gowns. The movement was started to prevent extravagance in dress at commencements, it being asserted that the cost of the gowns prevented children of persons in moderate circumstances from graduating.

Robbers visited the general merchandise store of Harry Lukens, in Eddington, three miles from Bristol, at 3 o'clock the other morning. They broke the panels in the doors and pried their way into the store, making considerable noise. In the meantime Mr. Lukens heard the noise and fired at the robbers. The robbers exchanged many shots with Mr. Lukens and his employees, but finally fled.

The office of F. G. Stritzinger & Co., millers, Norristown, was wrecked by the explosion of nitro-glycerin, which robbers used to blow open the safe. The robbers did not secure any booty. There was no money in the office and the outside doors of the safe were not even locked. There was a placard on the safe door to that effect, but the thieves are supposed to have blown up the safe out of spite. A railroad crossing watchman about one square distant and in full view of the place heard the noise of the explosion at 3 o'clock, but was unable to locate the sound as a freight train

GIRL'S TRAMP ACROSS MEXICO.

Ohio Girl Had No Trouble Till She Tried to Enter a Mine.

Miss Hazel Mason, 19 years old, has the distinction of being the only white woman who ever followed the mountain trail on horseback from Oaxaca, Mex., across the continental divide, to an Indian village forty miles away. When Miss Mason walked through the village every Indian woman on the place would run and look at her, commenting on her features and physique. Their favorite remark was "Que alta," which translated means, "Gee, how tall."

Miss Mason's home is in Toledo, O., but she has lived in Detroit, and spent six months in Mexico, going to that country last winter and remaining until a short time ago. While in Mexico the native Indians gave Miss Mason a wide berth, as they considered her a hoodoo.

They are very superstitious, but did not attempt to molest her till she wanted to go down into a mine. When the Indians learned of this they protested, telling the superintendent they would never work in the mine again, as it meant certain death to the workmen for a woman to enter the shaft. Another of their superstitions is gold or silver again.

Because of these superstitions the native women are not permitted even to look down the shaft.—St. Louis Republic.

Novel Action to Insure Marriage.

In the harbor of the little village of Ploumanach, in the Cote-du-Nord, is an islet of rock which can be reached at low tide. It is surmounted by a shrine of St. Guirec, who is said to have landed here from Britain in the sixth century. There are two rude statues of the saint, one of which is of wood.

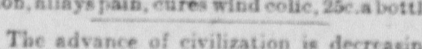
