Were Discharged by Recorder Goff When Agreement Was Hopeless.

NAN FAINTED DEAD AWAY

New York, May 4.-At 1.30 o'clock this morning the jury in the case of Nan Pat on, tried for the third time on the charge of murdering Caesar Young, was called into the court room by Recorder Goff. When the 12 men were in their places and the court officials had all arrived, the recorder asked why the defendant had not been brought into court. A deputy sheriff

He added that their disagreement seemed hopeless of adjustment. Upon this announcement Recorder Goff formally discharged the 12 men composing the third jury that has considered this celebrated case. It is understood that a majority of the jury was for acquittal, but in what proportion they stood cannot be ascertained.

Miss Patterson collapsed on the jury's announcement and fainted dead away. She was assisted from the court by one of her counsel and several court attendants and revived in an antercom.

Recorder Goff before dismissing the jury cautioned them not to tell how they stood.

I. company, "with the corrupt use of a large sum of money and other valuable considerations to induce the 'Ridgway Syndicate' to withdraw its bid for the lease. I hope, thereby," he says, "to establish fraud upon which legal proceedings can be based to void the existing lease to the U. G. I. company, and restore the property to the city, thus enabling it to offer a new lease in open competition MR3. ROGERS GETS NEW TRIAL to the best bidder."

Nelson is believed to be the representative of the owners. The dwellings will be repaired for workmen of new plants.

Relative of President Lincoln Dead. Richmond, Va., May 6 .- Abraham B. Lincoln died at the old Lincoln homestead, Lacy Springs, in the valley of Virginia, aged 82 years. His father, cousin of President Lincoln, moved to this state from Kentucky 100 years ago. Abraham B. Lincoln strongly resembled his famous relative. He is the last of his generation.

Carlisle Editor Dead. Carlisle, Pa., May 6 .- Frank G. Graham, formerly managing editor of the Kansas City Times, and who was twice elected city clerk of that city, died from paralysis at the home of his sister here. Mr. Graham was a graduate of Dickinson College and was 42 years of age.




THE FLYING CONE.

An Odd Chinese Toy and How to Make and Work It.

This interesting and in many respects remarkable toy had its origin in China, where the peddlers use it to announce their coming by the humming sound that it produces. Of course it was made of heavier material and of a larger size in its original farm, but when it was introduced into Europe it became so popular that men, women and children played with it and an eminent scientist, a professor in the University of Cambridge, spent much time in studying its movements and finally succeeded in explaining it mathematic-

To make the toy fit together two cones at their points. Then get two

small, light sticks about two feet long each and fasten a string a yard long to an end of each.

The player holds the other ends of the sticks, one in each hand, allowing the string to rest on a table. He then places the double cone near the right hand stick at the middle joint, where the cones are joined. The illustration will show you how they are joined.

The cone having been placed near the stick on the right, the player lifts that stick steadily, and the cone begins to revolve and run down the string. Now toss the cone up a little way and bring the string back to its original position, and the cone will continue to revolve. Repeat this slight movement until the cone is revolving rapidly.

As you acquire skill with it you may toss the cone high into the air and catch it spinning on the taut string or you may make it run up the stick to your arm.

Don't be discouraged if you cannot do this at first. Keep at it, and it will give you more fun than spinning a top ever did when you become expert. Various other feats with it will suggest themselves when you have become sufficiently skillful.


