In a conversation with a Democrat reporter at 10 o'clock both men stated that they had not lost hope and that they would believe in a chance for freedom even up to the fall of the trap. At that time the men were in the list of spirits and seemed as happy as could be expected under the existing circumstances.

While on the scaffold Dillen corrected the false rumor concerning the death of Livingstone. He stated that neither he nor his companions were in any way implicated in the alleged killing and that as far as he knew the escaped prisoner

Among the many spectators at the execution were a number of relations of the murdered turnkey, Jerry Condo.
