SECRETARY MORTON'S PLANS.

He is Likely to Leave the Cabinet Before the Fall.

Washington, D. C. (Special) .- Secretary of the Navy Morton has admitted that he expects to leave the Cabinet before the cold weather comes again. He expects to go back to his old place with the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe hailway, as the place he relinquished before entering the Cabinet has not been filled since he resigned.

The first persons to reach the scene of the wreck were almost unnerved by the awful spectacle. In the light of the blazing cars scores of half-naked men and women were seen rolling in agony on the ground, while from the burning pile of wreckage came the heartrending shrieks of those who were imprisoned C., paymaster of the transport Lawton, in the path of the flames. A few of these unfortunates were released and carried to a place of safety by the gallant rescuers, but the resistless sweep of the fire soon drove back the would-be rescuers, and the shricks and groans gradually ceased as one by one the victims succumbed to the flames.

Practically every sleeping person in Harrisburg was awakened by the explosion, and the news and extent of the disaster spread rapidly. The entire force of the Police and Fire Departments was ordered to the scene and every vehicle that could be used for an ambulance was pressed into service. As fast as the injured could be collected they were all the physicians of the city and many volunteer nurses, in addition to the regular staff, were ready to dress their injuries. Husband and Wife Dead.
