

The Latest Pennsylvania News Told in Short. Order.

The new macadam road built under State management, between Kennett Square and West Grove, was formally opened and inspected by Governor Pennypacker, State Highway Commissioner Hunter, Congressman Butler and other officials Saturday.

Edward Wickersham, of Coatsville, and Miss Aida Watkins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sparks Watkins, were married at the bride's home, in West Grove. Rev. J. R. Watkins, grandfather of the bride, performed the ceremony.

Fire that originated from an overheated stove partially destroyed the furniture warehouse and undertaking establishment of Newton E. Walton and damaged the shoemaking establishment of Ephriam Wagoner in Hatboro. The estimated loss is \$2000.

The public School building at Woolrich, Clinton County, was destroyed by fire. The loss is \$3500.

Mrs. E. F. Shearar, of Carlisle, entered suit against the Philadelphia & Reading Railway Company, for damages for the death of her husband, killed in the wreck last September at Rourk's Curve.

A. B. Cummings, of Mechanicsburg, has purchased the famous trotter Rose Electric from J. B. Ryan, of Chester. The mare has a record of 2.211/4.

Blood poisoning indirectly due to vaccination caused the death of Ralph Berger, the 6-year-old son of Samuel Berger, near Shartlesville. The corn crop just busked and gar-

nemed is said to be the largest and best in quality ever grown in Berks County. The yield will probably exceed fifty bushis per acre. The trial of Gustav Aburg Closson, the

self-confessed murderer, of Morrisville. which was to have taken place Friday in Doylesville, was continued by Judge Mahlon H. Stout to the next term of Criminal Court in February. Miss Rebecca S. Lownes, of Solebury,

was awarded a silver medal as first prize in an elocutionary contest at Centre Hill. Patterson Council, No. 240, Knights of Columbus, of Patterson, N. J., numbering 150 members and accompanied by 50 guests and Robinson Military Band, visited Easton on an outing.

Chief of Police Williams, of Edwardsville, has notified football players that they will not be allowed to play Sunday in the fields in or near that town. A number of Rugby and socker teams have been formed and have been playing on Sundays.

Coroner Dodson will investigate the death of George Guenther, of Hazleton, who died at the Retreat Hospital. 

High Liquor Licenses.

The highest per capita receipts from liquor licenses are reported by the cities of Utah, Colorado, Minnesota, Illinois, Washington and Nebraska.

By state law Minnesota cities containing over 10,000 inhabitants can not license a saloon for less than \$1,000 per annum, but may increase this amount at their discretion.

In Illinois the general dram-shop license for cities is \$500 or more per annum, at the discretion of the local authorities. Licenses in Washington must be

between \$300 and \$1,000 per annum. In Nebraska cities a license can not be granted for less than \$1,000.

The laws for other states mentioned either require or permit the collection of large amounts by cities for liquor lice asos


