BY-LAWS OF THE CENTRAL COMPANY.

SECTION I. The annual meeting of the Company shall be held at Centre Hall on the second Tuesday of January of each year.

SECTION II. Quarterly meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held on the second Tuesday of the months of January, May, August and November.

SECTION III. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President on demand of a majority of the Directors.

SECTION IV. At the annual meeting of the Board of Directors there shall be elected from among the Directors a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer who shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected.

SECTION V. In case of a vacancy in the office of Secretary caused by the death or inability to secure a member of the Board to serve, the Board may fill the vacancy by appointment of any member of the Company.

SECTION VI. The board shall keep an accurate record and account with every Branch Company organized by the Central Company, giving the number and location of the Company, names of Directors and officers, capital stock, number of instruments employed, receipts and expenditures, surplus fund, etc., and perform such other duties as may be required by the Company under the Constitution for the successful management of the business affairs of the Company.

SECTION VII. The Board of Directors shall adopt all necessary rules for the organization of Branch Companies, and have proper supervision over them to assure their successful organization.

SECTION VIII. The Board of Directors shall make quarterly reports to the County Grange of the standing of all Branch Companies and submit its books and accounts to the auditors of the County Grange at the close of each fiscal year.

SECTION IX. The fiscal year of the Central Company shall close on the second Tuesday of January of each year. The fiscal year of the Branch Companies shall close on the first day of January of each year.

SECTION X. No person shall be allowed to use a telephone for more than five minutes at any one time. Any person or persons using the telephone, who shall refuse to discontinue talking at the expiration of five minutes, when requested to do so by any other member wishing to use the line, shall be fined the sum of ten cents for each and every offense.

SECTION XI. Common conversation shall not be permitted when the use of the line is required for the transmission of business messages. It shall be the duty of all members to see that this article is rigidly enforced.

SECTION XII. No abusive, profane, or obscene language shall be permitted to pass over the line. Any person so offending shall be fined the sum of one dollar, and shall be deprived of further use of the line until the fine is paid.

SECTION XIII. No person shall be allowed to take down the receiver for the purpose of listening to a message passing over the line. Any person persisting in the violation of this rule shall be dealt with as the company shall deem most fit.

SECTION XIV. The Board of Directors shall serve without compensation until the Company is permanently established.

BY-LAWS OF BRANCH CO.

SECTION I. This Company shall be known as Branch Company, No. . . . of The Patrons Rural Telephone Company.

SECTION II. The annual meeting of the shareholders of this Company shall be held on the first Monday of January of each year.

SECTION III. At the annual meeting the shareholders shall elect three directors, who with one director appointed by the Central Company and one director elected by the local Grange that is a shareholder shall constitute the Board of Managers.

SECTION IV. The Board of Directors so elected and appointed shall organize by electing from among their number a president, secretary and treasurer, who shall serve for one year or until their successors are elected.

SECTION V. The regular meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at . . . on the . . . day of each month, and a majority of the directors shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION VI. It shall be the duty of Board of Directors at the annual meeting of the shareholders to submit a detailed statement of all the business transactions and financial standing of the Company before dissolving for the election of the new board.

SECTION VII. It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to make quarterly statements, (or whenever required to do so by the Central Company,) and submit its books together with an annual report to the auditors of the Central Company at the annual meeting of the Central Company on the second Tuesday of January of each year.

SECTION VIII. This Branch Company agrees to use the instruments, connections and exchanges designated by the Central Company and charge the uniform rate of toll to be fixed by the Central Company.

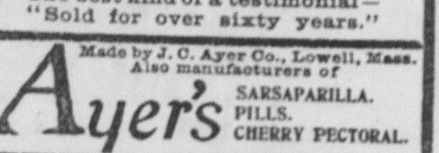
