

THE P. R. TELEPHONE COMPANY.

Organized at Centre Hall, Monday, ... Branch Companies with over six ...

The directors of The Patrons Rural Telephone Company met in Centre Hall Monday and effected an organization by electing Hon. L. Rhone, president; John S. Dale, vice president; S. W. Smith, secretary, and James C. Gilliland, treasurer. Willard Dale, a director, and D. M. Campbell, secretary of the County Grange, a spectator, were also present.

The Patrons Rural Telephone Company was organized but a few months ago, and up to the meeting on Monday the business was transacted by a committee appointed by the County Grange. At its first regular meeting, the directors were gratified to receive the reports of the establishment of six Branch Companies, having over sixty telephone subscribers. In addition to that, there are several Branch Companies well under way of organization, and in a number of sections the subject is being advocated and agitated.

There is little doubt but that by the first of April fully one hundred telephones will be installed in farmers' homes, all under the control of The Patrons Rural Telephone Company, and connected with the Bell system.

Odd Fellows' Homes.

There are seven Odd Fellows' Homes located in Pennsylvania. The Rebekah Home at Philadelphia, organized in 1894, cares for wives and widows of Odd Fellows and for dependent Rebekahs; the house and lot cost \$9,000. The Home for Orphans of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia, was organized in 1893, with the object of caring for and educating the orphans of deceased Odd Fellows; the building and lot cost \$37,000. The Odd Fellows' Orphans' Home of Central Pennsylvania, at Sunbury, similar object, organized in 1896, has 177 acres of land and investment of \$17,500. Located in Allegheny, with bequest of building and lot, is the Home for Widows and Orphans of Pennsylvania, organized in 1890, which cares for and clothes its wards. The Odd Fellows' Home of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia, established in 1874, cares for indigent Odd Fellows over sixty-five years of age; the buildings cost \$17,000. With buildings and eight acres of land costing \$28,000, the Odd Fellows' Home of Western Pennsylvania, at Meadville, organized in 1872, cares for and educates Odd Fellows' orphans. At Grove City is the Odd Fellows' Home for aged and infirm members and their wives and dependents. It was established in 1901, and the buildings and 106 acres of land cost \$26,500.

After Insurance Commissioners.

Without a dissenting voice, the House and Senate Tuesday evening adopted the report which places the brand of malfeasance in office upon former Insurance Commissioners Israel W. Durham, James H. Lambert and George B. Luper, and puts upon the additional odium of conspiring to filch from the State Treasury money for which no services were rendered.

Sharpless, of Colwyn, former Directors of the Poor of Delaware county, who were convicted last September of falsifying the books at the Delaware county Almshouse while in office, were sentenced Monday by Judge Johnson to \$80 fine and one year's imprisonment, with solitary confinement in the county jail.
