

THE TEACHERS' PENSION FUND.
A pension fund for school teachers is being talked of in every gathering that has to do with educational matters. If the teachers' pension fund is to be created the best way to do so would doubtless be to ask the help of the prospective beneficiaries, the teachers themselves. To raise the fund by taxation would be unfair to other public employes, who would feel entitled to like benefits, and the logical outcome would be a demand for old age and disability pensions at State expense for the whole community.

Any plan involving compulsion, in form of an annual assessment to be deducted from the teachers' salaries, cannot be too strongly condemned. Insurance against the contingencies of death, old age and disability should commend itself to everybody, school teachers not excluded, as a measure of precaution; but it should be left to the volition of the individual whether he or she make such desirable provision by savings, by the purchase of a policy in an insurance company or by the creation of a fund to be administered by his or her employers.

It may be difficult for young and pretty school-ma'ams to realize the possibility of ever needing aid from a pension fund. Few of them look forward to a life term in the classroom. Many, if not most of them, anticipate the coming of a time when matrimony, or some undefined but agreeable combination of circumstances, will relieve them from the drudgery of teaching. A number of them, nevertheless, though perhaps only a small fraction, will grow old in the harness. Those who happily will escape this fate should not begrudge their less fortunate sisters the benefit that would accrue from a pension fund; even if it be necessary to draw on meagre salaries to contribute toward its creation.
