Where License Money Goes.

The mercantile licenses all go to the state, excepting officers' fees.

All the wholesale brewers', distillers' and bottlers' licenses go to the state, excepting officers' fees.

Retail liquor licenses granted in the county are as follows: In a city of the third class each license costs \$550.

Fifty dollars of each license goes to the county. Balance goes to the respective cities.

In boroughs each license costs \$300. Fifty dollars of each license goes to the state. Thirty dollars of each license goes to the county and the rest goes to the respective boroughs.

In townships each license costs \$100. Twenty dollars of each license goes to state. Fifteen dollars of each license goes to the county and the balance to the respective townships.

The property destroyed includes the tabernacle, restaurant, boarding house and thirty-one cottages, and was located near Philipsburg.

The Centre County Mutual Fire Insurance Company, P. of H., generally known as the Grange Company, carries risks to the amount of \$5,400,000.

The average cost of insurance, including survey, policy, premiums assessed and all other moneys collected for the thirty years the company has been in operation has been nineteen cents a hundred.

The second annual district Sunday school convention of Union and Boggs townships and Milesburg borough will be held in the Baptist church at Milesburg Thursday, May 16th.

DEATHS.

MISS LIZZIE DURST. After an illness of but a few days of pleuro pneumonia, Miss Lizzie Durst died at her home on Church street, Centre Hall, Monday at ten o'clock in the morning.

Interment will take place in the Lutheran-Reformed cemetery, this (Thursday) forenoon, service in the Reformed church by Rev. D. Gress, the pastor of the deceased.

Miss Durst was the daughter of George Durst, Sr., deceased, and was aged seventy-two years. She is survived by three brothers—Cyrus, Boalsburg; George, Centre Hall, and Phillip, Centre Hall.

The deceased was a woman of very quiet disposition, and much attached to her home. She was a partial invalid for many years, having received an injury to her spine by being thrown from a horse when a young girl.

MRS. MARTHA STUMP. Early Thursday morning of last week, Mrs. Martha Stump died at her home in Centre Hall, aged about seventy years. Mrs. Stump had been ill for several weeks of pneumonia.

Interment took place Saturday afternoon, Rev. G. W. McInay, of the Methodist church, officiating.

Mrs. Stump's maiden name was Strong, and was a native of Poters Mills. About forty years ago she became the second wife of William Stump, deceased.

About 1873 the Stump family moved from Centre Hall to Virginia, where Mr. Stump died. Five years ago the widow and an adopted son returned to Centre Hall to make their home.

The deceased is survived by an adopted son, Charles Stump.

EDWARD COLE. At the advanced age of about seventy-three years, Edward Cole, of Pleasant Gap, died of general debility Friday morning.

Interment took place Monday forenoon. The deceased is survived by his wife and eight children: Laurence, Dayton, Ohio; Mrs. Jennie Kuhn, Dayton, Ohio; Mrs. Alfred Robb, Altoona; John, Zion; Willis, Colorado; Mrs. Harry McClintey, David and Samuel, all of Pleasant Gap.

Mr. Cole was a farmer by occupation, but had retired some years ago.

JOSEPH FLORAY. The death of Joseph Floray occurred at his home in Pleasant Gap Sunday evening, and interment took place Wednesday morning.

His age was nearly thirty years. During his earlier life he followed shoemaking, but on account of age had not been able to follow his trade for a good many years.

The deceased was a brother of Samuel Floray, of Tusseyville, and is survived by a widow and three children, namely: Mrs. Mary Dolan, Miss Lizzie and William, all of Pleasant Gap.

Under Act to provide for the incorporation and regulation of certain corporations, approved April 28th, 1874, and its supplements, by William A. Neese, E. K. Smith, E. F. Shook, W. W. Neese and Jacob D. Breon, for the charter of an intended corporation to be called Liberty Cemetery Association, the charter an object of which is to maintain a Union Cemetery in Gregg township, Centre County, Pennsylvania, and for that purpose to acquire and hold real estate necessary for said purpose, and to have the right to sell and convey burial lots and erect such buildings as may be required for the purposes of the Association, and for these purposes to have, possess and enjoy all rights, benefits and privileges conferred by the said Act and its supplements.
