DEMOCRATIC PRIMARIES

Democratic voters of Centre county will meet at the regular places for holding the general elections, in their respective election districts, on Saturday, June 2nd, 1906, to elect delegates to the County Convention.

Under the rules of the party, the officers for holding the primaries will consist of the committeeman and two assistants in each district, and the election will be opened at 3 o'clock p. m. and close at 7 o'clock p. m.

The delegates chosen at the above stated time will meet in the Court House in Bellefonte, on Tuesday, June 5th, 1906, at 12 o'clock noon, and nominate the following:

One candidate for Congress.  
One candidate for Senate.  
One candidate for Assembly.  
One candidate for Jury Commissioner  
Three Congressional Congresses.  
Three Senatorial Congresses.  
A Chairman of the County Committee to serve from the 1st day of January, 1907, to the 1st day of January, 1908, and transact such other business as may come before the convention.
