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DIED AT NINETY.

William G. Waring, the Originator of Teachers' Institutes in this County and First Principal of State College, Died Friday.

The venerable William G. Waring died at Tyrone, Friday of last week, aged eighty-nine years, seven months and fifteen days.

He was an Englishman by birth, but came to this country early in life, locating at Philipsburg, where he engaged in teaching a night school. Later he came to Harris township and taught school at Rock Hill (Linden Hall) and Boalsburg.

He was the originator of the teachers' institutes in Centre county and in the state. In 1859 the Farmers High School, now Pennsylvania State College, was founded, and Mr. Waring was made its first principal.

Mr. Waring was married in 1846 to Miss D. Malinda Coble, who died in 1861. Of five sons born to them there are living W. George, engaged in assaying in Webb City, Missouri...

Interment was made in Altoona Monday.

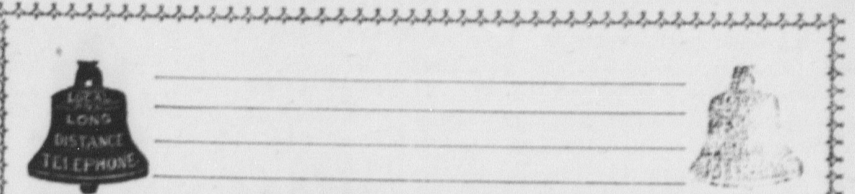

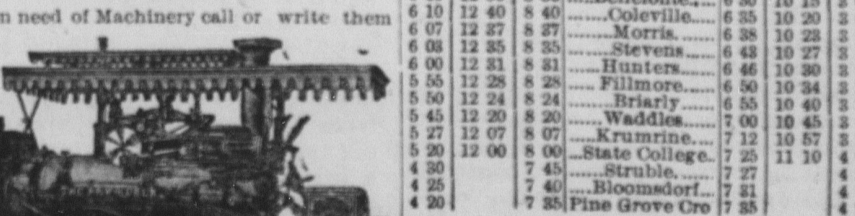
