THE GRANGE RALLY.

A Grand and Glorious Meeting of Grangers—One Hundred Members Take the Sixth Degree.

The joint meeting of the Pennsylvania State Grange with the Centre County Pomona Grange, Friday of last week, exceeded the expectations of the most sanguine friends of the Order.

The morning session was opened by Worthy Master George Dale, of the Centre County Grange. Hon. Leonard Rhone, on behalf of Progress Grange, cordially welcomed the assembled Patrons, and was pleasantly responded to by Prof. Mairs, of State College, on behalf of the County Grange.

The stage of the hall was beautifully decorated for the occasion. The program for the morning session was the illustration of the four degrees of the subordinate Grange. The Master of the County Grange called the officers of Progress Grange to the chairs, when N. B. Schaeffer, Master, declared the Grange closed in the first degree and opened in the first, and without an instant delay, the Assistant Stewards, Roy Schaeffer and Edith Lutz, conducted a class of six to the Grange room, where they journeyed over fields and through forests to the attainment of the first position in the Order.

The work was done in a very impressive and enthusiastic manner. The court was beautifully arranged to represent the spring season of the year. At the close of this degree the Worthy Master of the County Grange called the officers of Logan Grange to the chairs. They took charge of illustrating the second, or Summer, degree of the Order. Worthy Master Elmer Swartz declared the Grange closed in the first and opened in the second degree, when immediately the Assistant Stewards, John Dale and Mrs. Willard Dale, conducted a class to the hall to illustrate this ideal degree of rural life.

The officers of Progress Grange were again called to the chairs to illustrate the degree of Harvester and Gleaner, (the third degree.) The Worthy Master declared the Grange closed in the second degree and opened in the third when the class was promptly conducted to the field and started on its journey to the third position in the Order. The court was symbolically arranged to illustrate a harvest scene on the farm.

The officers of Logan Grange then took charge of the winter, or fourth, degree. The court was beautifully arranged to represent a gathering at the homestead with neighbors and friends. The marches and circles were beautifully executed, and at the close of this degree the entire Grange was conducted to the lower hall where a grand noonday feast was served free to all in attendance.

The courts of the several degrees were beautifully arranged symbolizing the four seasons of the year through which the farmer conducts his labors and recreations annually. Thus making the work of the Grange part of the farmers' daily pursuits, inspiring a love for rural life, and what could be more appropriate than for the farmers of a community to associate periodically in this friendly way, for which purpose the Grange was instituted.

In the afternoon a class of fifty received the fifth degree and a class of one hundred the sixth degree. The master of ceremonies in the sixth degree was State Master W. F. Hill, who also instructed the class in the unwritten work of the Order. This over, the large class marched to the banquet hall where they were served with refreshments.

The evening session was public. The spacious hall was filled with members of the Order and others indirectly interested in the work. Mr. Ebs was made chairman. The speakers were Master Hill, State Secretary J. T. Allman and Prof. Mairs. The program was interspersed with choruses, duets, solos and recitations. Those who sang were Misses Bertha Strohmeyer, Sarah Breen, Mrs. D. W. Bradford; and the recitations were by Mrs. Gardner Grove, Miss Marshall and Mrs. Bradford.

Obituary.

James A. McClintic was born near Siglerville, Centre county, February 26th, 1838, and died at his late residence in Spring Mills, Centre county, June 12th, 1906, aged sixty-eight years, three months and sixteen days. He was united in marriage to Miss Elizabeth Grove, of near Farmers Mills, Centre county, December 25th, 1860. To this union one child was born, who died in infancy. His wife preceded him to the spirit world four years ago last April.

He united with the Presbyterian church at Centre Hill under the pastoral care of Rev. Robert Hamill, D. D., in October, 1862. Since then he endeavored to lead a Christian life as much as he possibly could. He left his brothers, sisters and friends an evidence that Christ was his all in all. His dying words were: "My Christ was walking with me through the valley and shadow of death." He leaves to mourn his loss four brothers, two sisters and a host of sorrowing friends.

Funeral services were held in the Union church, near the cemetery, conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. H. Schuyler, D. D., assisted by Rev. D. Gress and Rev. G. W. McClintic.
