

**SALVATION ARMY HOLDS RELIGIOUS SERVICE AT JAIL.**

Jacob and James From seemed to be affected by the Reading of Isaiah 59th Chapter.

The Bellefonte Daily News in its Monday's issue printed an account of a religious service held at the County Jail in which Jacob and James From, the accused murderers of Josiah C. Dale, participated. The Reporter has no comments to offer, but publishes the account as it appeared in the News, except it omits the passage of scripture which may be referred to by the reader at his will. The News says: Sunday the Salvation Army held a religious meeting at the County Jail. Four men are confined there, two of whom are Jacob From and his 17 year old son James, who are accused of murdering Josiah C. Dale. The singing and prayers of these good people seemed to melt the elder From's heart. As he wept, he prayed that God would see him and his boy through safely. He said if God would answer his prayer he knew he would be a free man next Sabbath.

When the captain of the corp sang and prayed with him he acknowledged believing in Jesus Christ and that He has power to save. When the scripture as found in the 59th chapter of Isaiah was read, it seemed to effect him greatly, and when the lady asked him if his heart was right with God he told her he felt satisfied that he was saved.

The strain of being away from his wife, who has been quite ill, is weighing heavily on the prisoner's mind and nervous system. He cries continually and keeps saying "My poor wife and boy." He told a reporter of this paper that Jimmy said "Pop, this is Sunday and this is the day the religious people come to the jail and I am going to ask them to pray for us and for mom."

Jacob says his boy calls over to him every night before he goes to sleep that he should not forget to pray for his "mom."

Squire Keichline and Chief Millard were in Centre Hall Tuesday presumably to look up evidence bearing on the habes corpus proceedings to be held Saturday.

**Search Warrant Issued.**

Tuesday a search warrant was issued to search the premises of Jacob From, at the foot of Nittany Mountain. The paper was served by Constable W. H. Runkle, Detective Millard accompanying him. It is reported that some articles found in the house were identified by persons owning them. Mrs. From who is suffering from a tumorous growth, remonstrated with the searching party, and when the officers attempted to enter one of the rooms, she left her bed and with clenched fist made demonstrations. The officers paid no heed to her.

**Supervisors Organize.**

The new board of road supervisors organized by electing Adam F. Heckman, president, and H. M. Frantz, secretary. James A. Keller, the retiring supervisor, was elected treasurer. T. F. Royer resigned as supervisor. The board recommended that J. Wes. Foreman be appointed by the court to fill the vacancy.

**In the Legislature. INTRODUCED IN THE HOUSE.**

Mr. Wood, Fayette, providing that the State Livestock Sanitary Board, through the local assessors of townships, precincts and wards of counties, cities and boroughs, shall annually tax each male dog \$2 and each female \$4, the net proceeds to be used in paying damages to sheep caused by dogs.

Mr. Weddell, Westmoreland, requiring that all children be vaccinated before the age of six years.

Mr. Hulings, Venango, presented a bill to tax every steam railroad 1 per cent. on its capital stock unless it accepts the Constitution of 1873. The bill is designed to reach a number of corporations which have so far refused to file their acceptances.
