

Weekly Review of Trade and Latest Market Reports.

New York .- R. G. Dun & Co.'s

Weekly Review of Trade says: The only idle machinery is reported at footwear factories, where spring deliveries are about finished and fall contracts have not yet arrived freely. This is a seasonable event, and the temporary reduction of about one-third in active capacity is not an alarming sign. A few small strikes are also interrupting manufacturers, but in the aggregate a very limited part of the nation's producing power is inactive, and most of the idle machinery is due to the scarcity of labor.

Pig iron cannot be produced with sufficient rapidity in this country to meet the requirements of steel milis, more Middlesborough iron being imported, despite a further advance in foreign quotations. Prices of all forms of iron and steel are strong, and some sales of pig iron for delivery during the last half of the year are made at \$22, Valley furnace, against \$21 only a few weeks ago.

Saved Life By A Penknife. Quick work by Dr. Julius London of the house staff of Lincoln Hospital saved the life of Ludwig Hirsch. a young man who has been confined in the hospital for a week, suffering from throat trouble. While he was walking through the ward he saw Hirsch on his bed breathing heavily. The man was slowly strangling to death. The only instrument the Doctor had handy was a penknife. Dr London hurriedly got out the knife, and, dipping the blade in a cleansing solution, quickly made an incision in the throat of the suffering man. This afforded immediate relief, the incision being an exterior one, and a few minutes later a tube was inserted in the opening.

23,000 Consumptives In New York. Consumption is killing New Yorkers every day, according to the latest report of the Department of Health. Iwo hundred and ten death was the record last week. The daily average for the whole State is 44.

The State Department of Health at Albany has issued an order requiring the registration of all cases of tuberculosis. It is now classed as a contagious disease. Nearly 23,000 cases of tuberculosis were reported in this city last year.

A Buenos Ayres cablegram to London says that as a result of the drouth the demand for corn in the republics of Argentina and Uruguay will be much greater than usual and the amount available for export to Europe will be proportionately reduced.

The imports of the United States from Spain for the calendar year 1906 amounted to \$11,442,000, an increase of \$1,926,600 on 1905, and exports amounted to \$20,553,600, an increase of \$4.386,400 on 1905.

The Largest River.

A sea rather than a river is the Amazon, with 160 miles of width at its mouth. The Amazon drains a territory of 2,500,000 square miles, 10 times the area of France, and in connection with itself and its tributaries there are said to be 50,000 miles of navigable water, one-half of which is suitable for steam navi-

gation by large vessels. The number, length and volume of the Amazon's tributaries are in preportion to its magnitude. More than 20 superb rivers 1,000 miles and upward in length pour their waters into it, and streams of less importance are numberless. At the junction of the Ucayali with the Amazon a line of 50 fathoms does not reach the bottom, and in breadth it is more like a sea than a river. The longest tributary, the Madeira, has a length of 2,000 miles.

The distance from the source of the Amazon in the Andes to the Atlantic Ocean is 2,000 miles in a direct line, but by the course of the river it is nearly 4,000 miles .-- Chicago Tribune.
