Dr. Meyer Goes to State.

Among other changes in the heads of departments in Pennsylvania State College is the succeeding of Prof. I. Thornton Osmonds, dean of the school of Mathematics and Physics, by Dr. J. Frank Meyer. Mr. Meyer is a native of Gregg township, being a son of Squire J. S. Meyer, of Penn Hall. He is a graduate of Franklin & Marshall College '94; later he took a course in Physics at Johns Hopkins University. About five years ago he was selected an instructor at the University of Pennsylvania, in the Department of Physics, where he received the degree of Ph. D., and later was elevated to an assistant professorship. Dr. Meyer has at all times been diligent and progressive in his studies, and this appointment comes well merited. Prof. Osmonds, who resigned, will retire from teaching.
