

DEATHS.

HARRISON KLINE.

At the age of sixty-six years, Harrison Kline died at his home in Bellefonte to which place he moved last spring. Death came in a peaceful manner Tuesday morning. Interment will be made this (Thursday) afternoon, in Bellefonte.

The deceased was born in Troxville, Snyder county, May 14, 1841.

Religiously Mr. Kline was an adherent of the German Reformed church, and politically a staunch Republican. During the campaign of 1896 he was elected treasurer of Centre county on the Republican ticket.

On November 12th, 1863, he was married to Miss Annetta Gentzel, who died in 1869 leaving four children, namely, Elizabeth, wife of Elmer Showers; D. M., a farmer of Spring township; Henry, of Bellefonte; Robert, of Bellefonte. Mr. Kline was again married April 7, 1872, this time to Miss Sarah Gephart, of Zion, and to them were born two children, Anna C., wife of Clark Carson, and Orian, of Bellefonte, one step-son, Wm. Royer.

Mr. Kline has one brother and three sisters living, namely, Rev. Robert Kline, of Allentown; Mrs. W. A. Ishler, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Harry Meese, of State College, and Miss Alice Kline, of near Bellefonte.

MRS. WILLIAM CONDO.

The death of Mrs. William Condo makes the fourth member of the Bower family who died within eighteen months. Mrs. Condo died at her home in Aaronsburg, Sunday afternoon, and interment was made Wednesday, Rev. Donat, of the Reformed church, officiating. Her age was about eighty years. The deceased's maiden name was Mary Bower, and is survived by two brothers—William and Cornelius Bower, of Haines township.

It is singular that four sisters—Mrs. Eva Mingle, Miss Julia Bower, Mrs. Daniel Kerstetter and Mrs. Condo—all died within the past eighteen months, or thereabout, and their ages ranged between eighty and eighty-seven years. Besides this, in the same space of time, both Mr. Kerstetter and Mr. Condo died.

EMANUEL BROWN.

The death of Emanuel Brown occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. James A. Feldler, in Williamsport. His age was seventy-two years and two days.

Most of Mr. Brown's life was spent in Centre county, and for a time he conducted a store in Bellefonte. Interment was made in that town Wednesday morning.

Four children survive as follows: T. Clayton, of Bellefonte; John, of Mill Hill; Mrs. J. A. Feldler, of Williamsport, and Mrs. Philip Miller, of Atlantic City.

Irish Dueling Code.

The Irish dueling code was drawn up by the Irish bar at the Clonmel assizes in 1777 and appears to aim at so arranging matters that no Irishman anxious to fight shall be balked by his wish. "The first offense requires the first apology, although the retort may be more offensive." "After one fire the retort may be explained away. But if either party," the code hastens to add, "would rather fight on, after two shots each the principal who made the retort may explain and then the original offender tender his apology." "When the lie direct is the first offense, the aggressor must either beg pardon in express terms, exchange two shots previous to apology, or three shots followed by explanation, or fire on till a severe hit be scored by one of the parties." "No 'dumb firing,' or firing in the air, is admissible." "In slight cases the second hands his principal but one pistol, in gross cases two, holding another case ready charged in reserve."—Cornhill Magazine.

Preparing Brier Wood.

Brier wood for the pipes of American smokers is imported in great quantities from Italy. The larger part of the Italian brier wood is found along the Mediterranean coast. A kind of grubbing spade, with one sharp edge for cutting away the large billet or heart of the root (the valuable part) from the surrounding small roots, is used in this work. After being thoroughly cleaned and trimmed it is brought to the mill and by means of circular saws cut into small blocks corresponding roughly to the shape of a pipe bowl and stem. These blocks are of various sizes, depending upon the dimension and shape of the billet. Afterward they are immersed in boiling water for a period of about twelve hours and then thoroughly dried. This process completed, they are sorted, the imperfect pieces being thrown aside, placed in large jute bags and are then ready for shipment. The waste pieces unsuitable for pipes are sold for firewood.
