Preparing Brier Wood. Brier wood for the pipes of American smokers is imported in great quantities from Italy. The larger part of the Italian brier wood is found along the Mrs. G. M. Hall and daughter Vir- Mediterranean coast. A kind of grubginia, and Mrs. Joseph C. Hall, of bing spade, with one sharp edge for Huntingdon, and Miss Lenore Heims, cutting away the large billet or heart of the root (the valuable part) from the surrounding small roots, is used in this work. After being thoroughly cleaned and trimmed it is brought to the mill and by means of circular saws cut into small blocks corresponding roughly to the shape of a pipe bowl and stem.
